SCHOOL WORK WELL BEGUN

Weber Academy in Fine Shape—
Preparing Popular Lecture
Course.

REPUBLICAN HOLD PRIMARIES.

Montello Hostelry Burned to the
Ground—Death's Record—Must
Support Children.

Ogden, Sept. 24.—All the schools of the city and county have completed their enrollments and are now fairly well started on the work of the first semester.

At the Weber academy, the enrollment is considerably larger than it was last year. About 300 pupils have this far entered the school, and Principal Wilford McKendrick is of the opinion that the number will be greatly increased when the work is closed down for the year in many of the factories and plants throughout the county.

In all the departments the work has been fairly well started and organized, and excellent results are looked forward to. Athletics are receiving more attention this year than heretofore, and it is expected that the academy will make a good showing in the various games and events entered this fall and next spring. Benjamin E. Harker has charge of the physical instruction and is now coaching several teams in basketball. Preparations are being made for indoor events. In the gymnasium, much new paraphernalia is being added to make it one of the most complete gymnasiums in the country.

The band and orchestra under the direction of Prof. Ernest W. Nichols, are making excellent showings. From the ranks of the recruits and freshmen, the able leader is getting some musicians who promise to be valuable acquisitions to the two organizations, which are spending much time in practicing.

This afternoon, the lecture course for the entire school year will be outlined. It will consist of 12 numbers and will have the best that can be secured from the lecture bureaus. A number of societies and organizations of the school are being organized and a number of entertainments planned for the year so that the usual good entertainments and programs that have been rendered at the academy heretofore will be repeated this year.

Athletics was the principal topic of discussion at a meeting of the Athletic association of the High school, held yesterday afternoon, and at which much enthusiasm was shown. Two football teams are being organized and will be ready for the first game in about two weeks.

FIRE AT MONTELLO.

Advices were received at the office of F. E. Lewis, superintendent of the dining cars and hotel department of the Harriman system in this city, of the destruction of the railroad eating house at Montello, Nev., entailing a loss of \$2,700. The flames started through the explosion of a kerosene oil lamp falling eight feet from a ceiling onto a table. MUST SUPPORT CHILDREN.

Charles Pincock of the Ogden police force, leaves today for Riverside, California, where he goes to bring back Philip F. Geiger, who is wanted in this city upon the charge of violating the new state law which requires a father to support his children. This is the second time within six months that Geiger has been arrested in Riverside, and held for the local officers. SMITHFIELD

Ole Hansen, A Veteran of 83, Closes Life's Labors.

Smithfield, Sept. 22.—Ole Hansen who died Sept. 16 was born in Vestor Land, Lund parish, Odense Amt, Fyen, Denmark, Sept. 26, 1825. Married Marie Hansen in 1854. Was baptized May 28, 1857, and came to Utah in 1870, his wife and four children having come here the year previous. In 1871, they settled in Smithfield. He has resided here ever since. Went on a mission to his native land in 1883, where he had the privilege of baptizing his oldest son as the first fruit of his labor. Deceased is survived by his wife, three sons, four daughters, grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren, all of whom are members of the Church. Served for many years as assistant in the presidency of the Scandinavians of Smithfield and was an active ward teacher. Death resulted from injuries received by falling from an apple tree. Funeral services were largely attended and were held in the Smithfield tabernacle on Sunday, Sept. 20, 1908, Bishop William L. Winn presiding. The speakers were: Elders Christian Larsen of Logan, H. C. Hanson of Minn. Creek, Idaho, C. J. Plowman and Bishop William L. Winn of Smithfield, all of whom spoke of him as a good neighbor, honest, useful citizen, and devoted Latter-day Saint. During the services Miss Carrie Thomas of Logan sang "O My Father," very beautifully.


