MINING DISPUTE.

#### Administratrix of Moroni William Sues Gilmer, Salisbury & Co.

Kate Gutheil, administratrix of the estate of Moroni Williams, deceased today filed a new complaint in the district court against J. T. Gilmer, Monroe Salisbury and O. J. Salisbury, partners as Gilmer, Salisbury & Co., to recover \$5,500 alleged to be due on a contract entered into by and between deceased plaintiff and defendants, under date of Nov. 20, 1882, whereby defendants agreed to pay said plaintiff \$16,000 for the Peabody mining claim, situate in the Bingham district, and thereafter the Bingham district, and thereafter paid \$10,000 on the contract, but refused to pay the balance, which was in event of sale.

On October 13, 1899, the plaintiff commenced suit on this claim against the defendants, as partners, and O. J. Salisbury personally. Later the defendant, O. J. Salisbury filed his personal answer to the complaint and the case went to trial upon the issues thus raised. Plaintiff put in her testimony, where-upon the said defendant moved the court for a non sult, which was granted. From this judgment the plaintiff appealed to the Supreme court, but the ower court's action was sustained, and the plaintiff has now begun this action against the defendants severally.

#### BUSINESS NOTES.
