QUEBEC WILL TAX EXPORTS OF WOOD PULP

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 14.-The province of Quebec will put an export tax into ef Quebec will put an export tax into effect Sept. 1 upon pulp wood ship-ments to the United States. The an-nouncement comes publicly from Mr. Taschereau, minister of public works for the province, that the plans have not been changed for putting this ex-port tax into effect, even if the action of the provincial government may bring on the threatened tariff war and disruption of trade relations with the neighboring nation.

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Ossining, N, Y., Dec. 14.—There is a literary scandal in Sing Sing prison. Some of the convicts are dishonest, ac-cording to charges made by the editor of The Star of Hope, the newspaper published by the prisoners. The editor claims that some of his contributors have been stealing gems of thought from other writers and sending them to the editor as their own. The rival newspaper published in Clinton prison showed in its last num-ber in parallel columns that one Sing Sing convict had sent in a poem by Julia Ward Howe as his own, while another contribution credited to con-vict No. 42,462 was original some years ago with William Shakespeare of Stratord, England.
