Fresh-water fish eat seeds of many land as well as water plants; and then, having given their bodies to fishing eagles and storks, the seeds have passed into the earth, and have grown. Some farmers at Natal came to the conclusion that certain injurious seeds were planted in their grass-land by the great flight of locusts passing overhead. Darwin accordingly examined some of the dried pellets of locustdung, and found some seeds, from which he raised seven grass-plants: so that a swarm of locusts passing over some solitary island lying far off in the sea, and naked, might bring to it the seed of its grass crops, and other birds might bring other plants; and we should expect to find there the flora of the nearest continent, or that most convenient to birds.

The Azores answer this description; their flora resembling that of Southern Europe, while the seeds of their flowering plants are of a kind easily transported by wind, by birds or by currents. There are caks, chestnuts, hazels, apples, beeches, alders, firs, the Portugal laurei, myrtle, laurustinus, and elder—all small berry bearers. Tree s with heavy seeds are conspicuous by their absence. Icebergs are among the seed-bearers and planters of our own times. The gulf stream has carried coccanuts and seeds of hickory across the Atlantic to the shores of Shetland, where they have not sprung up in consequence of the difference of climate. Slow But Sure. THE BURGUNDY SNAILS A GREAT FRANCH DELICACY.

The example of the great snail industry in Burgundy, which is acquiring greater development year by year, owing to the fine quality of the fiesh of the vine-leaf fed mollusk, has stimulated the Swiss to efforts in the same direction. A number of gardens between Daves and Landquart, in the canton of Grisons, have lately been transformed by their owners into snail farms. During the summer time the children are employed to gather the snails from field and hedge and bring them to the farms, where they are placed in bushes and fed on refuse vegetable leaves. A thick bed of sawdust surrounds each bush and serves the double purpose of an insuperable barrier to the escape of the inhabitants and a shelter for the winter. At the approach of cold weather the snails, which have then waxed fat, bury themselves in the sawdust, and close the door of the house on their back. They are raked out, packed up in two hundred weight baskets and sent off to Italy, where, as "Burgundy snails," they sell at 18 francs [to 20 francs the package.—New York Sun.






