SHIPPING FRUIT BY THE TRAINLOAD

Peach Crop Above Average in Quality and Quantity—Shortage in Apples.

ASSIGNMENT OF TEACHERS

For Ogden City Schools—Dr. Beatty Makes Recommendations for State Industrial School.

Ogden, Sept. 12.—The Ogden Fruit Growers' association is now in the height of the busy season and is shipping on an average of 10 cars a day from Ogden, Riverdale, Willard, and other places in the district. On Thursday afternoon a train of 25 cars of local fruit was shipped to eastern markets, and a train of about the same size left Friday night. The crop this year is above the average in quality as well as quantity. The peach market is very crowded and only half the price is paid for peaches this year that was paid last year. There is a shortage in the apple crop, which is the first this district has experienced in a number of years. While no material advance in the price of apples has been noted thus far, it is expected that a raise will be announced before the end of the month.

OBJECTS TO LOCKS.

Danger of Locking Industrialists in Rooms in Case of Fire.

Ogden, Sept. 12.—Dr. T. R. Beatty, of the state board of health, has submitted a report to the board of trustees of the State Industrial school, setting forth what he believes to be the cause of the epidemic of typhoid fever which has had a grip on the institution for several weeks past. The report is of some length and sets forth the manner in which the contagion spread in the school. According to Dr. Beatty, the milk became contaminated by flies which distributed the germ at milking time. After commenting upon the case Dr. Beatty concluded his report with the following statement: "I am calling to your attention a matter not connected with the direct purpose of my visit which came to my notice. I refer to the manner in which girls are locked in their rooms. In the event of a fire, many of them would be unable to escape. The plan of the building is such that the narrow hall leading to the rooms would be quickly blocked by fire and smoke, and it would be impossible for any person to release the inmates. I would respectfully suggest the installation of an automatic system of locks operated from one central location."

The interment was in the city cemetery where the grave was dedicated by Elder E. A. Larkin.

GOLD PLATE INVITATION.

Fred J. Kiesel of Ogden and one of the members of the executive committee of the irrigation congress, which meets in Albuquerque, New Mexico, within a month, is backing a move for the sending to President Roosevelt an invitation engraved upon a gold plate to attend the sessions of the congress this year. Mr. Kiesel said that Governor Curry of New Mexico would be the bearer to President Roosevelt of a similar invitation, and thought that Utah should do likewise.

PROMOTER FOR INTERURBAN.

J. H. Dana, of Coffeyville, Kansas, has been in the city investigating the conditions for the building of an interurban line through Weber and Boxelder counties, and possibly through the canyon to Ogden valley. He is a promoter of some prominence and is stated represents capitalists who are interested in a number of interurban lines elsewhere in the country. While his visit was in conference with Mayor Brewer regarding the purchase of the city's water right in South Park canyon, which would be for the establishment of a power plant.

In attendance July 31, 165 men; 155 women; total 321; Admitted during August 6 men; 4 women; total 10; Under care and treatment, 172 men; 168 women; total 340; Discharged 6 men; 5 women; total 11; Died, 1 man; total 1; In attendance August 31, 167 men; 154 women; total 321. The superintendent also reported having filed on the springs in State canyon in behalf of the state mental hospital. The board will review the matter before the next legislature who will be asked to make the necessary appropriation for the construction of a pipe line for the springs to the institution. The board also gave the authorization to secure an engineer to survey and submit the approximate cost of the above line.


