BONDS REDEEMED.

The state land board today took up the last of the \$108,000 refunding bonds, authorized by the last legislature. These bonds bear i per cent interest, refund-ing the old 6 per cent issue of 1891. It was the hope of the legislature when it passed the bil refunding the issue and authorizing its purchase by the state land board that the latter could take the entire issue within three years. Because of a number of heavy timber land sales, however, the board is now able to take over the last bond, only cight maniha after the signing of the bill. The interest money goes to the general school fund.

State Land Selector C. H. Karvey will leave today for Weston, Oneida county, there to investigate the claims of one William Heusser, who is adver-tising to make final proof on a homestead in section 36, township 15 south, range 37 east. This township was surveyed at the re-

quest of the state, under the law granting the state certain lands for school and public improvement purposes. This ct gives the state prior right to filing It secures the government survey. It has been the practice of the hoard, though, to waive its rights in case of conflict with actual and bona fide set-tlers, the state taking lieu lands for

those occupied by settlers. Selector Harvey makes this special trip because the board believes that the state has the prior right to all this land. It is believed that Heusser and other settlers who are advertising to make final proof squatted on the land after the government survey had been made, and thought to make final proof without the cognizance of the state land board.
