

## UTAH BUILDING AT PORTLAND OPENED

It is Not Large, but is One of the  
Most Beautiful at Lewis and  
Clark Exposition.

### EXHIBIT LARGELY MINERAL.

In Charge of Dr. Bradford—Agricultural Display Under Care of Mr. L. A. Ostlen.

Portland, Or., June 16.—The Utah, one of the small but beautiful state buildings at the Lewis and Clark centennial exposition grounds, was opened to the public today, the building and exhibits being practically complete. The exhibit is largely mineral in character, though the educational feature forms an important section of the display.

L. A. Ostlen, from Utah's agricultural college, is director of the educational exhibit, and Dr. R. A. Bradford, of the University of Utah, is in charge of the mining display. Spencer Clawson, director of the entire exhibit, who was called to Salt Lake City on legal duty, returned to Portland today.

### NEW CHANNEL FOR NOME. Will be 2,000 Feet Long With Rock Jetties.

Seattle, Wash., June 16.—The Nome Improvement company, organized here, but financed by eastern capitalists, has signed a contract with Capt. E. W. Johnston of this city to dredge a channel 2,000 feet long and to build rock jetties 750 feet in length at the mouth of the Snake river, at Nome, Alaska. The work was authorized by Congress in the last river and harbor bill. The contracts call for the expenditure in 18 months of \$250,000. Congress grants the company the right to collect toll on passengers and freight using the channel. The construction of the improvement will greatly reduce the cost of landing passengers and freight at Nome, saving to shippers and miners. It is estimated \$200,000 yearly over the present cost of handling business in the northern port. The work will be done under the supervision of the United States engineers.

### Miller's Resignation Accepted.

Washington, June 16.—Asst. Secy. Melville W. Miller of the department of the interior has presented his resignation to the president, and has been accepted. In succession to Mr. Miller the president has appointed Jesse Wilson of Indianapolis.

### ARNOLD-ANDREWS HANGED. Two Years Ago They Murdered Mrs. Amanda Youngblood.

Canon City Colo., June 16.—Frederick Arnold, aged 29, and Newton Andrews, aged 21, were hanged at the state penitentiary tonight for the murder of Mrs. Amanda Youngblood in Denver two years ago. The execution was successful in every detail. Andrews made a statement in which he admitted firing a shot during the struggle at the Youngblood home, but that the bullet went into the ceiling without injuring anyone. He said he was very drunk at the time and did not realize what was being done. Arnold had nothing to say.

Denver, June 16.—The crime for which Arnold and Andrews were executed at Canon City tonight was the murder of Mrs. Amanda Youngblood on New Year's eve two years ago. Arnold, Andrews and another youth named Charles Peters, tried to rob the Youngblood store and met with resistance. Mrs. Youngblood was shot and killed. The three were arrested, tried and sentenced to death. Peters became insane and thereby escaped the death penalty.

### More Yellow Fever on Isthmus.

Washington, June 16.—Gov. Magoun in a cablegram to the isthmian canal commission reports three new cases of yellow fever and one death on the isthmus, as follows: Matias Matamoros, 24, laborer, Panama; Miguel Brocan, American, 35, time keeper; P. F. Yalaby, American, 24, redoubt; 2. Existing heretofore reported as ill, died June 15.

### Fatal Fight Over a Girl.

Spokane, Wash., June 16.—A special to the Spokesman Review from Stites, Idaho, says: Ed W. Williams was killed and H. F. Schiesler, who shot him severely wounded in a gun fight which arose over Maude McMillan, a girl employed in the White Front restaurant. Williams was shot through the abdomen and died ten minutes later. Schiesler was shot through the elbow and in the abdomen, but probably will recover. There is talk of lynching Schiesler, and the talk is strongly guarded.

### Arrested for Smuggling.

New York, June 17.—Ramon Rosales, agent for a gold mining company, has been arrested as he was leaving the Mexican steamship Monterey. He was taken in charge by a custom inspector after a box full of rings had been taken out of a coat which Rosales carried on his arm. The rings were set with precious stones believed to be worth several thousand dollars. Rosales said he had intended to send the rings to Italy at once and thought it unnecessary to declare them for duty. Nevertheless, he was locked up.

### Emma Nevada in London.

London, June 16.—Emma Nevada, the American singer, after many years' absence, has returned here at the Waldorf theater in "La Traviata" as Violet. She was given a great reception.

## IMPROVEMENT IS MODERATE.

Business Conditions Fair, Progress is Along Conservative Lines.

## NO SPECULATIVE EXCESSES.

Brighter Outlook for Crops—In All Departments Past Week Much Better Than Year Ago.

New York, June 16.—H. G. Dun & Co's Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: "Moderate improvement is noted in commercial conditions, although progress is along conservative lines and there is no evidence of speculative excesses. Mercantile payments are more prompt, the brighter crop outlook having a salutary effect on all commercial operations. Railway earnings thus far available for June average 5.7 per cent higher than last year, and foreign commerce at this port for the last week shows gains of \$1,355,312 in exports and \$2,636,898 in imports. In every department of business the past week makes a strikingly favorable comparison with the corresponding week of 1904, when prices were tending downward and there was much complaint of the early summer dullness, yet there is no indication at the present time of the unreasonable enthusiasm that threatens stability through reckless purchases in excess of wholesome consumption with requirements. Irregularity continues in the hide market. Many divisions are nominal, and foreign dry hides have declined another fraction, making a loss of a full cent from the recent high point.
