There will be a Leap year ball next Friday night, in the Twenty-second ward meeting-house annex.

Bishop Olmstead of Colorado will remain in this city over Sunday, and preach in St. Paul's church.

J. C. Schuckers has gone to Vernal, where he will meet C. L. Maxwell and look after their gasoline interests.

The Short Line passenger department is in receipt of a lot of fine large photographs of noted views along the Idaho system.

Local furniture men say that there are lots of new novelties this year in their line, novelties that are useful as well as ornamental.

A. H. Fotheringham is at St. Mark's hospital suffering from a sprained back and badly cut head as a result of an accident in the Majestic mine.

Rue Smith, who was arrested Monday afternoon for passing counterfeit coins had a hearing before United States Commissioner Twomey this afternoon.

Lieut. Col. Greenwald will return to his command at Scofield in a few days, as his business will then be in such shape as to enable him to leave the city.

The sale of the property of delinquent taxpayers will be commenced by County Treasurer Carls tomorrow, Dec. 21. The personal property will be sold first.

Capt. "Billy" Williams of H company returned home yesterday afternoon, accompanied by a two weeks' growth of beard. The combination is striking and much admired.

The Phillips Congregational Sunday school primary teachers will give a reception (tomorrow afternoon at 6:45 East Third South street, to the mothers of their little pupils.

James E. Russell will give a stereoscopic illustrated lecture tomorrow afternoon and evening in Church House ward amusement hall, on incidents in ancient and modern history.

The Bell Telephone company has just completed stringing another pair of wires between Logan and Idaho Falls, 55 miles, which means an additional circuit to all the north country.

In the next few days County Treasurer Carls will call in for payment all the outstanding warrants of the county, there being about 3,500, aggregating about \$100,000 and the treasurer's office will do business on a cash basis.

A boy baby was left the other evening on the doorstep of Louis Williams of Murray, wrapped in an old undershirt. As Mr. and Mrs. Williams are childless, the little wanderer has been adopted, and given a good home.

Carelessness on the part of workmen excavating for a canal on Fourth street yesterday, resulted in the breaking of a watermain which flooded the vicinity, and the water had to be shut off several hours until the break could be repaired.

Judge H. P. Henderson and ex-Senator Arthur Brown have dissolved the partnership maintained for 12 years, to take effect Jan. 1, and the judge will enter the law firm of Phillips, Critchlow & Barrett. What the ex-senator will do is a matter of conjecture.

D. A. Callahan has a pretty souvenir from the Yale-Harvard football game, it consists of a button of blue enamel, which appears the letter "Y" in white, with a royal blue ribbon beneath, to which is attached a miniature rubber foot ball, with "Harvard" on its side.

Senator Simon Bamberger tells Governor Wells that, although he is in need of the services of his stenographer who is with the guard in the coal fields, he young man will not be sent for under any circumstances, and that his face is ready for him on his return from the field of duty.

That the Westminster Presbyterian church is growing under its new pastor is evident from the number of additions to its membership. Twenty-two persons were added to the church last Sunday, 17 being of the profession of faith and five by letter.

Engineer Grosh of the General Electric company of this city has returned from Rexburg. He says the new local electric light plant will be in running order in one week, and that the light and power plant at Blackfoot is in successful operation. The latter plant is supplied from the American Falls plant 50 miles distant.

There is a growing complaint from drivers of vehicles on South Main street of trucks that are frequently dropped from carts carrying away debris from building sites. There is a call for the street supervisor to look after the cartmen, as the rocks and rubbish dumped along the highway are a constant source of stumbling to horses.

The idea of an intermountain state fair in this city, as first suggested in the "News," is meeting with favor, and the agricultural growers are now taking the matter up editorially and urging that this very thing be done. Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming, with possibly New Mexico and Arizona, might profitably unite in either an annual or biennial fair.

Article of incorporation of the Woodmen of the World Hall association of this city, have been filed in the county clerk's office. Its capital is \$100,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each. The object of the association is to build and maintain a Woodman hall in this city. L. N. Tanner is president; Angus McFarlane, Jr., vice president; H. H. Don, treasurer; R. W. Dols, secretary.

It is the intention of the management of the Utah Light & Power company to concentrate all of its main generating plant at the Jordan station, and the central station back of the Tribune at a distributing plant. The main trunk delivery wires will be buried on West Temple street. The company is preparing to install a fast and reliable distributing plant, which shall cost \$100,000; that is, three other great generators like the one now being set up.

At a meeting of the Young Men's Republican club, held in this city last night, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: P. P. Christensen, president; J. J. Meyers, vice president; John May, secretary; Horace Smith, treasurer. The executive board will consist of nine members, the officers elected and five others to be named by the new president. The bond of the treasurer, who has \$1,000 to be paid in case of loss, is \$1,500. The club has 40 members.

"Blacklock" is reported as likely to do damage in this state, as it has broken out among herds in Carbon county, and to a limited extent west of this city. Secretary Beatty of the state board of health has issued a statement to keep a lookout at once, and notify the state board of suspicious conditions. William J. He declares it is in a valuable position and that nothing has been done in development of the claim, the other stockholders refusing to put up the money. On these grounds and because no one can now get any value out of it he asks for a judgment ordering an auction sale.

ABOUT TELEPHONES.
First Line in Utah Was Under Direction of A. Milton Musser.
To correct a misstatement published in the "News" several days ago, Mr. W. B. Douglas submits the following: "The first telephone line in Utah was run from Bishop Edward Hunter's office (now Bishop Preston's), to the president's office in October or November, 1877, under the direction of A. Milton Musser, who was the first agent of the Bell Telephone company in Utah." The fact that the telephone was made at the time referred to, in presence of a large company of invited guests, some of whom were in President Taylor's office and some in Bishop Hunter's, was not then popular, as you had to talk through the receiving phone and not through a transmitter, as now, as the transmitter was a late improvement. The fact that the line was said to have been created is pure imagination, as none existed, and people merely hoped to see the invention prove an ultimate success, for in November, 1877, it was merely in its infancy. Telephone tests were made the same month between Ogden and Salt Lake City over the wires of the Deseret Telegraph company, showing that long-distance work was within the range of early possibility.

LITTLE GIRL BURNED TO DEATH.

Horrible Death of Four-Year-Old Zola Schaeffer While Playing With Her Brother.

SHE STOOD NEAR A BONFIRE.

Flames Caught Her Dress, Despite frantic Efforts of Mother to Save Her Child.

Zola Schaeffer, aged 4, daughter of J. P. and Frances Schaeffer of 231 Charles street, was fatally burned yesterday afternoon, and died shortly after midnight. The child was standing by the road watching the burning of dried grass and leaves, when the flames got under her clothing, and set her on fire. The little girl's brother, Selph, aged 5, was standing near and cried: "Oh, Zola, your clothes are on fire." The two children then ran screaming to the house. The mother heard the child's cries and ran frantically towards her, followed by Mrs. Mangel and Carl Krisher. They seized the little one and began tearing her clothes off. Mrs. Schaeffer, Mrs. Mangel and Krisher were badly burned about the hands and arms in trying to extinguish the flames. The child was quickly taken to the house and a physician summoned. The wounds were dressed and everything possible was done to save her, but it was a hopeless case from the start. She lingered in a semi-conscious condition until after midnight when death came. She was so badly burned that the nervous system was partially paralyzed and in this the little one escaped much acute pain. From the tops of her shoes to her head she was blistered and on some parts of her body the hair was burned off. The little girl's father is an engineer for the Utah Light & Power company and is stationed at the plant at Jordan station.
