Base Ball.—The second game of the return series, between the Reds and the Deserats, was played on Saturday afternoon, and won by the latter, with a score of 8 to 5. BY TELEGRAPH. **EASTERN.** Return of Gen. Sherman. WASHERMAN, General Sherman, who returned this morning from his extended trip, is in excellent health, and speaks in high terms of the various military positions regarding them models of neatness and efficiency.

Fortification Reports. NEW ORLEANS, 7.—Deaths, 41; cases reported, 115; total deaths, 3,212; total cases, 10,600.

Paris, 7.—Gen. Borel, French minister of war, has sent Gen. Noyes, the American minister, to France for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers in the United States.

Memphis, 7.—The steamer John W. Chambers, from St. Louis, laden with supplies for the infected points, between here and Vicksburg, arrived early this morning. The steamer leaves this afternoon, and will take all the mails for points below, which has accumulated since communication was cut off. Unusual activity prevails at the Howard and Leachman's Hotel, and cures are being sent to all the interior points adjacent to Memphis where the fever has appeared.

Dr. R. R. Hunter, the Howard physician at Mason, Tenn., reports nine new cases having developed yesterday.

A telegram from Gallierville, Tennessee, brings intelligence of eight cases in that town. Five new cases of fever are reported at Gallierville, Tennessee. The weather is clear and warm since six o'clock last night; 23 deaths are reported by the undertakers.

Baton Rouge, 7.—One hundred and eleven new cases and 11 deaths of yellow fever are officially reported, with one physician to hear from, for the 48 hours ending this morning. The weather is clear and constantly doing its work. Assistance is coming from every quarter.

The Indian Raid. GALVESTON, 7.—A special from Mason, Texas, 6, says: Information has been received of Indian raids near Junction City. Three girls, and a boy named Dorsey, were killed on Johnson Fork, of Guadalupe River. Reports from the surrounding country show that the Indians are stealing stock and murdering settlers. A general raid is feared.

FOREIGN. **GREAT BRITAIN.** The Silver Market. LONDON, 7.—The Times financial article says: Even at 51½ pence per ounce, the silver market is very unsettled, and the uncertainty of the market is a general depreciation.

The Glasgow Bank. The excitement over the collapse of the City of Glasgow Bank has subsided. The name of the Glasgow firm of ship-builders, who were killed on the 4th inst., is William Simons & Co., of Penton. The other ship-builders are likely to find it difficult to secure orders, and the security of the bank is in very bad condition.

The Hungarian Ministers. VIENNA, 7.—The resignation of Von Szell, the Hungarian minister of finance, will probably take effect immediately. The question of the acceptance of the resignations of the Hungarian ministers, will probably await the meeting of the Diet. It seems that Count Andrássy is despatching a special commission to the Diet, to inform them of the resignation of the Hungarian ministers, which will be completely settled.

The Emperor and Empress. The Emperor of Austria, on his return to his city from Godal, will grant an audience to the leading members of the Austrian Parliament, on the subject of the reconstruction of the Christian ministry.
