## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**The Reynold's Case.**—Advices from Washington are to the effect that the Reynold's polygamy case, on appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States, will not come up for hearing until the 15th instant.

**Territorial Convention.**—The People's Territorial Convention will be held in the City Hall, this evening, at 6 o'clock. There should be a prompt and full attendance, of all the delegates from the various counties, who will meet for the purpose of nominating for the November election Delegates to represent the people of Utah in the next Congress of the United States.

**Base Ball.**—A match game of base ball, played at Washington Square this forenoon between the Mutuals of Mill Creek, and the Stars of Salt Lake, resulted in a victory for the Stars, with a score of 8 to 5. The game was one of considerable merit, both sides acquitted themselves honorably. On the other hand, the Reds must win to-day, and, if they do, will have to play again Saturday, in order to decide the championship. To-morrow and Saturday are the days to conclude the series.
