SUGAR PLANT ALL READY.

Factory at Nampa Completed Ahead Of Contract Date.

So far as the memory of those concerned in the sugar industry goes, the first sugar factory to be erected and ready for operation ahead of the contract date is the plant of the Western Idaho company, at Nampa, Ida. The Dyer company of Cleveland who signed a contract ten months ago, guarantee ing that the plant should be ready for operation on Sept. 1, have just notified General Manager Thos. R. Cutler that the institution has been completed and ready for the beets for some days past. and that for ten days they have been running on a water test. This they will continue 10 days longer, in order to thoroughly determine whether every part of the vast machinery of the big plant is ready for the juice of the beets. General Manager Cutler was naturally much gratified to receive the report from the Dyer company. He has giv-en orders to have the harvesting of beets commenced around Nampa and Payette next Monday, the 10th, as the tests from the beets show that they are in fine condition and ready to be worked. A sufficient quantity of beets will be received at the factory to justify the plant starting up on Monday, 17th, and from the present outlook he run will continue from 60 to 90


