SHORT IN HIS ACCOUNTS. Army Officer Discovered "Baking" on the Mexican Central.

First Lieut. Arthur H. Freshwater of B company, Twenty-ninth infantry, stationed at Fort Bliss, Tex., fell short in his post exchange accounts recently, and hiked over the Rio Grande river, or as they call it down there, "delotro lado." He went back to his post yesterday morning when it was discovered that a freight brakeman on the Mexican Central (McCall) was none other than the missing army officer.

The discovery was made at Jimulco, a division station in the state of Coahuila, and an attempt will be made to extradite the fugitive. The chances are that the Mexican government will send him back over the border anyhow, as an undesirable citizen, when Uncle Sam will take care of Freshwater. Mexican officials are very accommodating in such matters, and are ready to waive all red tape and tiresome formalities in criminal procedure, as United States government officials along the border are ready to return favors of that character when fugitives are wanted south of the Rio Grande.

Lieut. Freshwater is a Pennsylvanian aged 34, and was promoted from a corporal in K troop, Sixth cavalry, to be second lieutenant at Buffalo, N. Y., in the Fifth and Twenty-eighth infantry regiments before transfer to the Twenty-ninth, in Sept., 1903. He saw service in the Spanish-American war and in the Philippines. The headquarters of Freshwater's regiment are at Fort Douglas, Utah, but the officers here know little or nothing about the man.

FIREMEN KEPT BUSY.

Harper's Grocery Store the Scene of a Disastrous Blaze—Other Calls.

A blaze doing \$1,000 damage occurred yesterday afternoon at Thomas E. Harper's grocery store in the Galena block, the fire being caused by a parlor match which set fire to some rubbish in the rear of the store. Mr. Harper vainly tried to put out the blaze and received many painful burns on the arm and hand.

The proprietor went to the basement for a box of crackers. He struck a match and the head of it flew into a corner where the kerosene was stored and where some rubbish was. In a few seconds flames leaped up. Mr. Harper quickly seized the kerosene tank and rolled it away from the flames. An alarm was turned in and the department responded quickly and managed to get the blaze under control.

Mr. Harper valued his stock at about \$3,000 and carried \$1,500 on the same and \$200 insurance on the fixtures.

At 5 o'clock last evening, an alarm of fire was sounded from the residence of Mrs. Sarah Stringfellow, 124 east Sixth South street. A defective fuse caused the fire, but no particular damage was done.

At 6 o'clock another fire alarm came in. It was from the residence of Mrs. Laura Simpson, 330 south West Temple street. The fire was caused by a match being carelessly thrown into a pile of clothing. The damage done amounts to about \$5.
