FOREIGN NOTES.

The Russian War Department has decided to build a number of forts on the Austrian and Prussian frontiers. Four of these are to be begun at once. One will be near Proskurow, in Podolia; one near Dulno, in Volhynia; the third at Bialvstock, in the Government of Grodno, near the junction of the railway between Warsaw and St. Petersburg with that from Brest to Grajewo, and the fourth near Wirballen, the first Russian railway station on the side of Prussia. Each of these forts is to be within gun-range of the railway crossing the frontier in its vicinity. They are to be completed in two years' time.

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
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



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
