The fans were amazed at first, but in a few days they saw the wisdom of the move. White was beginning to decline as a great pitcher, but as an outfielder he is shining. Besides, he is hitting the ball at a clip around 350. This is the first time a star pitcher has been turned into a star outfielder since Cy Seymour made the change at Baltimore and later became champion hitter of the National league.

ROSEBEN, TURF CHAMPION, IS OUT OF SPEED GAME

New York. July 13.—Roseben, once the champion race horse of the American turf, and believed by many to have been the champion sprinter of the world, will race no more. David Johnson, his owner, has decided to ship him to the big farm of James W. Wadsworth in the Genesee valley, where he will pass the remainder of his days grazing on fine pastures.

Roseben broke down hopelessly in the forelegs after his race at Sheepshead Bay 10 days ago, when he was defeated by Nimbus. In that race, Johnson and his friends tried to make a big winning, and wagered large amounts of money on the famous champion at odds of about 8 to 1.

One of the sensational big winnings of the turf was made on Roseben two

years ago when his owner bet \$30,000 at even money that he could sprint seven furlongs in 1:25. He did it in 1:22 and Johnson won his \$30,000 and Roseben established a world's record which may never be equalled.
Roseben raced in California last winter and won some good races, but his legs commenced to trouble him and on his return to the east, it was seen that his racing days were over.


