Emigration from Switzerland has become so great in late years that predictions are made that unless it ceases certain districts will lose the greater part of their inhabitants, if they do not become literally depopulated. Returns are at hand from Berne which show that since 1821 the ratio has steadily increased, and in the past three years at a greatly accelerated pree. In 1877 only 380 persons left the canton; in 1878 the number was 477; in 1879 it was 941; in 1880 it was 1,638, and in 1881, 2,881, while for 1882 the number is expected to be larger still. Nearly all them sailed for the United States. Only 180 went to other countries, and of these 150 went either to South or Central America. Some insight into the treatment ment of Government employees in Germany is furnished by the experience of a workman on one of the royal Prussian railroads, who has just been petitioning for some aid in his old age. This man served in the same position for thirty-four years at one mark (about 23 cents). a day, and on this sum raised s family. Naturally, he lived from hand to mouth, and was unable to lay anything by. Being now over eighty years of age, and unfit for longer service, he has been dismissed from his employment; and to his petition for some relief for his closing days, the only answer has been the allowance of the sum of thirty marks in full and final settlement and the dismissal of his case. A special religion for the army has been promulgated in China. An official decree has been issued to Chinese civilians of every degree, temples of the War God, Quang-ten, from addressing any prayers to him and from offering up sacrifice, pub. licly or privately, in his honor. The ans.
