MARKET WAS VERY FEVERISH.

The Opening Was Rather Quiet and Irregular.

PRICES FOR STOCKS DOWN.

A Spasm of Liquidation Found the Market Without Support and Prices Go Tumbling.

New York, May 15.-London sent some good gains for Americans this morning in spite of reports of several small failures in that market incident to the settlement. The opening here was rather quiet and slightly irregular, but fractional gains predominated. St. Paul was up 34 Atchison 24, Union Pacific 256 and other railroad stocks between 1 and 2. Opening gains were largely reduced, and in some cases prices went materially below yesterday's close on a renewal of yesterday's iquidation. The announcement of the engagement of \$2,000,000 gold for expert added to the depression. Nothern Pacific sold under the short settlement price for the first time. The principal losses were 8 points in Northwestern, 5 in Northern Pacific, 4 in Consolidated Gas, 31/2 in Union Pacific, 3 in Delaware & Hudson and Missouri Pacific and 2@214 in St. Paul, Sugar, Atchison, Southern Pacific and Amalgamated Copper. The lower level attracted buying and the standard railroads and leading specialties rallied 1@3 points with Union Pacific leading, Recoveries, however, were not fully maintained and the market was irregular again at 11 o'clock. A spasm of liquidation found the market without support and prices fell to far below jast night's level. Losses of 1 to 3 points were very general throughout the active list. In Northwestern the decline reached 91/2: Union and Missouri Pacific 61/2; Amalgamated Copper 31/2; Denver & Rio Grande 41/2. There were some recoveries before noon, but the demand was in-

significant. Bonds were weak, The market continued very feverish and did not hold the recoveries, but only a few stocks got lower on the next dip than they were before. Union Pa-cific and Amalgamated Copper were most acutely affected, the former touching 95, and the latter 101%. American Smelting lost 41/2, Chicago & Eastern Illinois as much and General Elec-tric 9% in all. The market steaded up but the buying practically ceased on the

volume of dealings increasing at the higher level. The early losses were viped out with only a few exceptions and many stocks rose strongly over last night, especially among the trunk lines, grangers and Pacifics, in which the net advances extended to 7 points for Rock Island, 5% for St. Paul, 4 for Athison and Erie first preferred, 31/2 for Burlington and all the principal active stocks, including United States Steel from 1 to 3. Northern Pacific sold down to 139. The closing was slightly unsettled, but in the main firm and active near the top.



been successfully passed, so far as London is concerned. The opening prices of Americans, while they showed advances over those of the closing of New York yesterday, were wholly nominal and there were no transactions.

Four or five small firms are still in lifficulty, but it will not be known until 5:30 p. m., whether their checks have passed through the bank all right or not. In any case it will not affect the situation materially, all the houses needing assistance, having obtained it.
