TICKETS DEMAND BY REPUBLICANS

Dr. Chas. G. Plummer the Unanimous Choice of Convention For Mayor.

ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION.

Mention of Candidates Greeted by Cheers and Immediate Selection in Every Case.

For Mayor—Dr. Charles G. Plummer. For Recorder—Frederick J. A. Jacques. For Treasurer—Joseph Barnett. For Auditor—John K. Hardy. For Attorney—E. O. Hawthorn.

All that now precedes election day in Salt Lake is a series of rallies, and for the holding of these the beautiful month of October with all its rainy promises, is open to the free selection of politicians of every party. The last of the four tickets was picked yesterday afternoon in the Lytle theater, when nominations began with the selection of Charles G. Plummer to head the Republican ticket by acclamation.

The nomination was announced, tied down early to nominating candidates after a strenuous morning put in in a speech which for plain words has more clearly spelled out the Tribune's position in local city politics, any previous effort of Senator Rutherford in this line.

EDWARDS NAMED PLUMMER.

Harry C. Edwards nominated Dr. Plummer, and the confusion of applause which followed made it difficult to hear his voice. "I am not here," he said when the vote nominating him by acclamation was announced, "to give you any hot air. I am here to acknowledge with a great deal of appreciation and a great deal of pleasure the honor which has been conferred upon me. The nomination is very flattering to me and I appreciate the honor and the magnitude of it. I stand before you to represent clean Republicanism."

The resolution to Dr. Plummer's nomination was seconded by Harry C. Edwards in naming him said that those who had their ears to the ground realized that this was a Republican year. He declared that many who had left the party to follow false prophets must drift back this year because there was nowhere else to go, and that election day would surely find a big majority voting for clean Republicanism.

J. J. Greenwald seconded the nomination in a brief talk declaring that Dr. Plummer was not a Silver King man, which was something in his favor, and the work he could do in the public health would be of great benefit, especially to the children. G. H. Pierce also made a seconding speech, declaring in his personal tribute to the proposed candidate, Ed Colliver, made the motion for nomination by acclamation, and it was not opposed, a chorus of cheers indicating that it had passed.

JACQUES SECOND MAN.

Nominations for recorder were called for and G. H. Backman nominated J. J. Jacques, at present a deputy in the county recorder's office. Jacques was not opposed, and received the nomination by acclamation. Joseph Barnett was named for treasurer by H. A. McMillan. The name was greeted with cheering cheers and went through by acclamation.

Harry S. Joseph got the floor when nominations for auditor were called for. He nominated a person named John K. Hardy, and the young man proved to be everybody's favorite for he was not opposed, and went through with a lively cheer.

LEATHERWOOD THE LAST.

The city attorneyship was settled in the same cheerful fashion. County Clerk J. U. Eldredge, Jr., named E. O. Hawthorn, who has been county clerk, more cheerful, and the ticket was complete. The new city committee, as selected by the precincts, was announced, and then the convention adjourned.
