Refused to Buy Comstock Lode for \$100 and Horse.

"Godforsaken country," as he called it. For this and for \$100 he agreed to sell his claim. But Stevens had no faith in the land ever paying and refused to buy at any price. Comstock, who was fairly wild to get the horse and move away, plended with his friend almost with tears in his eyes for a good two hours, but Stevens remained obdurate, So Constock had to stay for a while, unless he should abandon his claim, but to held to the determination to leave at

the first chance. It was not long afterward that a speculator came over from California and offered him \$1,000 for the claim. Comstock jumped at it, and \$1 was paid lown to bind the bargain. A day or two later, however, silver in paying quanti-ties was discovered on the land, and the miners called a rough court and decid-ed that Comstock should have his land back. A few months later, says the New York Times, the discoveries ap parently amounting to little, Comstock sold again for \$3,000 the claim that has since produced many millions.
