TEAMSTERS TURNED BACK. Not Allowed to Go on Reservation - A

Hitch Somewhere. Special Correspondence.

Provo, Aug. 26.-Wm. D. Roberts of this city, who took a load of settlers to the reservation, with the intention of taking them on the reservation, has returned. He left on Tuesday and re-turned yesterday, being turned back at the point of entrance on the reserva-tion over the Strawberry valley route by the soldier patrol, which guards the teservation while it is under the charge of the Indian department. Mr. Roberts had the necessary permit (as he sup-posed) consisting of an affidavit taken before a notary public, stating that he was a teamster, and giving the names of the parties for whom he was driving (all men who were entitled to go on the reservation by reason of having rereports, that the paper would not secure him the privilege of entering the prom-ised land, and also that he (the cap-tain), had turned other teamsters back, who had obtained similar papers for the purpose of taking land seekers on the reservation. Mr. Roberts learned that this was perfectly true, and states that he knows of about 50 teamsters who have been devied entrance after they had complied with the order, as understood by them, requir-ing them to go before a notary public and make affidavits that they were going for no other purpose than
