

# FEEDING PEOPLE OF STRICKEN CITY.

It is Being Done Thoroughly and On Business-Like Principles.

## HEALTH CONDITIONS GOOD.

Water Rather Scarce, at Present Only Being Turned on at Certain Hours.

San Francisco, April 23.—The new San Francisco which will rise from the ashes of the old was in its first stages of rebuilding today. After five days of confusion and almost superhuman effort on the part of citizens of California's metropolis, the great task of sheltering, feeding and otherwise caring for the homeless thousands, complete order has been re-established and attention turned to the future.

### RAZING WALLS.

Throughout the great business district, where the devastation of the flames were the most complete, walls were being razed, buildings that had not disintegrated before the intense heat are being inspected with a view to reoccupancy, and even ground was being cleared for the immediate construction of some sort of building in which to resume business at the earliest possible time. In short, confidence has been restored.

The assurance of the insurance companies, the measures taken by the financial institutions, the prompt and reassuring word that had reached the business men of San Francisco from eastern financial centers—all these things went to clear away any feeling of uncertainty that might have existed in the minds of the timid that San Francisco would not again be what it was—the great center of population and business of the Pacific coast.

### RAIN A DRAWBACK.

The general situation temporarily suffered a setback early today, because of the chilling rain which fell in the late hours of last night and during the early forenoon today upon the thousands protected only by canvas coverings and even less impervious shelterings. While the rain caused considerable suffering for the time being, the conditions were quickly ameliorated by the prompt action of every relief committee doing duty, as well as by the voluntary acts of householders wherever it was possible to accommodate the men.

### FEEDING THE PEOPLE.

The people were fed today in a thoroughly businesslike and systematic manner. From the water front, where boatloads of provisions docked, there was an endless procession of carts and drays carrying food to the scores of sub-stations established throughout the city and the parks. At these stations food and drink comprising bread, prepared meats, canned goods, milk and a limited amount of hot coffee was served to all those who applied. About 1,500 tons of provisions are being moved daily from the water front.

### SUPPLIES OF BEDDING.

Large supplies of blankets, tenting and other material to provide coverings for those who have been scantily supplied heretofore are reaching the supply stations rapidly. Barracks have been completed at several points, and in these many people have found comfort and shelter against the inclemencies of the weather. The situation in the congested districts, such as Golden Gate park and the various public squares throughout the city, has been considerably relieved by the departure of many people for points on the other side of the bay.

### GENERAL HEALTH.

The general health conditions are most satisfactory. While the number of cases at the various hospitals has shown considerable increase, this is not an unexpected development of the past few days of hardships encountered by the homeless thousands. The most annoying feature is the absence of anything like an epidemic disease of any nature whatever. The somewhat unsatisfactory sanitary arrangements in the various camps, the lack of a variety in diet and the exposed situation of so many people necessarily develop ailments of every sort, and in some places there have been a few cases of infectious diseases, such as measles, chickenpox, etc., but the primary causes of disease are being remedied or removed as fast as possible.

Policeman Dow was ordered to halt at Page and Cole streets. The soldier commanded him to take a shovel and aid in the work of clearing away the debris in the street.

The fact that the officer was in uniform and wore his star seemed to have no effect on the soldier. He told Dow in plain English that he would shoot him if he did not go to work. The tables were turned when the soldier turned around to pick up a shovel for the man he was attempting to impress. Dow quickly drew his revolver, held it at the head of the soldier and marched him in front to military headquarters at Page and Schrader streets.

Policeman A. C. Williams reported a like experience when he reported at headquarters yesterday morning. He managed to persuade the soldier that he was exceeding his authority and after a brief argument was allowed to go on his way.

### STREET CARS TO RUN.

The street car companies announced today that four different lines were now in operation and service would be restored on these lines as soon as the city authorities would permit the turning on of the electric power. The electric lighting companies stated today that it was hoped that power would be available for lighting houses and streets within the next three or four days, or whenever it was considered safe to do so.

### KILLING OF MAJ. TILDEN.

One of the most unfortunate happenings since the city has been under the joint police supervision of the government, the municipality and the state militia was the killing at an early hour today of Maj. H. C. Tilden, a prominent member of the citizens' general committee and a well known merchant in the extreme southwestern part of the city. The killing was done by three armed men, who were on vigilance committee who fired upon an automobile carrying Maj. Tilden, a friend and the chauffeur returning from Menlo Park, whence Tilden had gone with his family.

The three men, displaying no badge of authority, ordered the party in the automobile to halt, following the demand almost immediately with a volley of pistol shots. Maj. Tilden was shot through the back and instantly killed, and the two other occupants of the machine wounded.

### TO WITHDRAW MILITIA.

The citizens' general committee of which the mayor is the presiding officer, adopted a resolution at its session today to withdraw the entire force of state militia that has policed a large residence section for the past few days. In adopting this resolution a vote of thanks was tendered the governor and the state militia for its services in the emergency. From this time on the city will be patrolled jointly by the municipal police and federal troops. Until the city militia is re-established, all persons arrested on felony charges will be taken to Fort Mason and turned over to the regular troops for safekeeping.

### SUPPLY OF PROVISIONS.

There is a vast supply of provisions on hand for the people of San Francisco. R. R. Keith, a chief depot commissary of the department of California, stated today that there were available 700,000 rations of supplies. This included those at the Presidio, Fort Mason, transport docks and railroad yards. More than 100 carloads additional are being distributed from the Southern Pacific yards at Fourth and Kentucky streets.

### MINT TO RESUME.

Supt. Leach of the Branch United States mint said today that operations could be resumed immediately. There is no lack of money at the mint, and New York transfers upon that institution will be paid upon presentation, but up to this time there has been no call for funds.

### THE OFFICIAL ESTIMATE OF DEATHS IS 277.

Washington, April 24.—The official report from Gen. Greely to the extent of the loss of life in San Francisco is as follows: "Fort Mason, San Francisco, April 23.—The military secretary, Washington. Very careful investigation made by Capt. Winn today limits, so far as information is obtainable, the entire San Francisco death list, from late disaster to 277; of these about 50 unknown gathered from various parts of the city, have been temporarily buried in Leavenworth and Bay streets, Washington Square, and Fortmounth square. In the Valencia hotel 14 bodies were recovered and 56 others are believed to have perished in the ruins."

### INSURANCE RECORDS GONE.

New York, April 24.—All the records of the San Francisco offices having been destroyed in the earthquake, the Equitable and the New York and Mutual Life Insurance companies have a large force of men at the home offices copying duplicate records. They will be sent west at the earliest possible moment.

### WILL SEND TROOPS.

Seattle, Wash., April 24.—Col. Noble, commanding the Tenth infantry at Fort Stevens, last night received instructions from the department to send two companies to San Francisco, and they will go forward today. At Portland they will be joined by two companies from Fort Wright.
