Pre-emption and Homestead of R.

Lands Bill.

WASHINGTON, 26.—The Chair

laid before the Senate the unfiled

business, being the bill to con-

firm pre-emption and homestead

entries of public lands within the

limits of railroad grants, in cases

where such entries had been made

under the regulations of the land

department. The pending amend-

ment being that submitted yester-

day by House, providing that not-

withstanding the fact that the bill

in the act shall be construed to

be inoperative in the State of

California, the bill shall be con-

strued to be inoperative in the State

of California, and the bill was re-

jected, yeas 53, nays 41.

Howe submitted an amend-

ment providing that nothing in

the act shall be construed to con-

fer upon the General Land Office the

power to restore to the public land

granted to a State for railroad pur-

poses. Rejected.

Cameron subjected to strike out

the third section of the bill, when

the grantee was in default in the

performance of any of the condi-

tions imposed by such grant, "so

that the section should read, that

all such pre-emption and homestead

entries which may have been made

by permission of the land de-

partment or in ignorance of the

rules and instructions thereof, were

in the limits of any land grant at

the time or subsequent to the ex-

piration of such grant be deemed

valid and in compliance with the

laws and the making of proof re-

quired shall entitle the holder of

the bill, having been considered

in committee of the whole, was

and he thought that fair and liberal.

These professors had an ad-

vantage over professors at other

colleges in the fact that in their

old age they had the privilege of

being retired on three-fourths pay.

The proposition, stripped of all its

difficulties, was whether \$1,000 a

professors. On the question of the

suit. There was not the slightest

feeling on the part of the commit-

tee to interfere in any particular

with the country as their pre-

decessors in the academy. He

wanted to repeal the idea that there

had been any purpose on the part

of the committee to interfere with

the administration of West Point

academy, which had shed so much

honor on the country.

He said this was the first of a

series of bills to be reported by the

committee on appropriations. He

therefore appealed to members not

to let their sympathies in favor of

West Point academy get the better

of their judgment. If their judg-

ment dictated them, this bill

would pass substantially as report-

ed, and if it did them the people,

who were now looking to Congress

with earnestness never before

known, would begin to breathe

freely and to hope.

Danforth believed the cutting

down of pay of West Point cadets

was retrenchment uncalled for by

any party or by any portion of the

people.

Wilson (Ga.) would be ashamed

to compromise in that direction.

Why had not the commit-

tee on appropriations reported a bill

to cut down the pay of members

of the House?

Holman—My friend should not

be too anxious about that. He

shall have an opportunity to vote

upon that proposition. We propose

to have retrenchment all along the

line.

Wilson—That is all right. When

the bill is reported, I will support

it readily. But I tell them they

are demoralizing their own

friends when they ask us to cut

down the pay of West Point

cadets.

Without action on the bill the
