LOCAL ITEMS.

GONE SOUTH.—President Orson Hyde left this
afternoon for Sanpete, after the labors of the
Legislature. With the coming spring a multi-
plicity of matters will occupy the attention of
the citizens of that county, after a three years'
Indian contest, in which President Hyde's
wise counsel and large experience will be in-
calculable value to the people. He expects to be
in the City again for Conference.

THEATRICAL.—Last night there was a pretty
good house for Mr. Hardie's Benefit, when he
appeared as "Macbeth." He is undoubtedly
ambitious of histrionic fame, as his choosing
this character for performance on his Benefit
night declares, and he is possessed of fine phys-
ical advantages, added to an excellent voice and
appearance, which, with careful cultivation,
arduous study and application would give him
a high position in the profession he has chosen.
His Macbeth was strongly marked with phys-
ical vigor, and considering his youth, was quite
credible. The music and choruses were very

plause and kept the audience till a late hour.
