J., the works of the American Smalling and Refining com-American Smelting and Refining com-American Smelling and Refining com-pany, at Perth Amboy, and the Bal-bach works, at Newark, N. J. Outside of this district there are works at Bal-timore, Great Falls, Mont.; and Ta-coma, Wash. The aggregate capacity of these works, at the end of 1905, was between 750,000,000 and 775,000,000 lb. of refined comper annum. In 1905 they refined copper per annum. In 1905 they were operated to full capacity. It be-came obvious that the further increase in the production of crude copper, which was to be expected, required additional refining capacity.
