DORANDO WINS.

Italian Runner Defeats Two Men in 12 Mile Race

Mile Race Fall River, Mass., Dec. 25.-In a 12-mile exhibition relay race at the ath-letic grounds in this city today, Dorando Pietri, the Italian Marathon runner, de-feated Floyd Doughty of Providence and Samuel Myers of Cambridge, by half a lan. Dorando's time was 1:07:08. That of the Doughty-Myers team was 1:01:18. A large crowd watched the contest, Doughty ran against the Italian in the first six miles and finished the first lap a few yards in the lead. Dorando took the lead in the second lep and was nev-er again headed. At the end of the sixth mile the Italian's lead was three-quar-

Myers then came on the track and by fast work cut Dorando's lead to a quar-ter of a lap. Dorando by the end of the eleventh mile, however, was half a lap ahead, and maintained this lead to the finish

First round-After a few moments of preliminary sparing, Johnson reached Burnis with a sharp left uppercut and the Canadian went to the floor, re-mating there for the count of eight. Third round-Burns swung his right to Johnson's head and then did some von-dertin execution at in-fighting, chopping his right to the ribs frequently. John-son during the round landed some ter-rife blows to the kidneys.

JOHNSON LAUGHS. Fourth round--When the men met in the corner of the ring Johnson shot a heavy right into Burns' ribs. The men talked wildly to one another, each seemingly intent on geting the other excited and landing the momey-winning punch. During the jeering they sparred hercely, but few blows being struck. Then Johnson swing left to the head of the Canadian. The bell found the men in a hard clinch. Fifth round--Apparently freshed from his minute's rest, Burns' started the round briskly, landing his right on John-son's head and punching the body with both hands, Johnson managed to slip over a few rights to head during the round. Sixth round--Johnson rushed and
