HOUSES AND FENCES WASHED AWAY.  
Floods in Texas.—Another Deuter Suleide.—Mexican Land Grant Claims.

By Telegram to the News:  
CARRIED AWAY.

The Waters in Mississippi Continue their Destructive Work.  
GREENVILLE, Miss., April 6.—The crevasse in the levee which broke at Catfish Point, is now from 1200 to 1500 feet wide and increasing. The water reached Greenville this morning and tonight rose one foot in the streets and is still rising rapidly.  
The main business street is now one sheet of water from Poplar Street to the new track, and the water is making its way over the sidewalks into the stores. A great many people had to vacate their residences to seek higher quarters on account of the sudden rise. Parties who arrived today from Greenwood, the greatest part of the journey being made in a surf, described the situation in the southern lowlands as terrible. With astonishing speed the water is spreading over the improved and cultivated land and forests. Many of the planters would have been at the end of another week or so through with their planting. Houses of all descriptions, and fences in long motions were easily carried away by the terrible current, and every conceivable household object was seen floating down to the Negro Phalia swamps. In the neighborhood of Greenwood, the water is rising so fast that the colored people. At every step the colored laborer, his family and all are

FURIED ALMOST DESTITUTE, arrayed in garments that have seen their best days and afford them but little comfort and protection. If no assistance comes to these people many will die from exposure. Food will soon be needed, and if not provided great suffering will be the consequence. The government officers have done a great deal of good in that section, but other sections now showing signs of approaching distress.

In the vicinity of Winterville a great many cattle are dying from a disease called hallow burn. At Mount Landing, seven miles below Catfish Point, the river for miles today, no doubt owing to the large levee. The Lake Washington country and the highest points on the banks of the beautiful lake are also rapidly disappearing out of sight, a thing which has not been known since 1854. The outlook is not hopeful for the planting of the overgrown district before May. Just as soon as the water subsides sufficiently it is supposed the lands can be temporarily closed, so that the crops may be protected against any future rise this season.

**Floods in Texas.**  
DALLAS, TEXAS, April 5.—Trinity river, like all the others, is overflowing its banks and much damage is resulting therefrom by the downing of stock. The dam broke at the unfinished city, waterworks above the city and now the \$250,000 pumping engine is 100 feet under water. The unfinished reservoir will sustain damage to the extent of many thousands of dollars.

**A Crew Perishes.**  
TORONTO, April 5.—Yesterday a large yacht was sighted headed for this port under full sail. An hour later she seemed in distress, but before a boat could reach her she capsized. No person was found aboard the vessel, though all the circumstances indicated that she had been manned. The name after was pointed out on her stern. None of the yacht men in this city know anything about the yacht or her crew, all of whom are supposed to have perished.

**Mexican Land Grant Claims.**  
CHICAGO, April 5.—A Washington special of the great problems that Congress has had to do with for the past fifty years is the settlement of Spanish and Mexican land grant claims in the interior mountain country in the west. Various efforts have been vainly made by the leaders of both houses to devise an acceptable and sufficient bill. From the present indication the House is going to send into the Senate, soon, just such a measure as will satisfy that body. This is Congressman Wickham's bill. To establish a United States land court and provide for the judicial investigation and settlement of private land claims in the Territories of Arizona and New Mexico and the State of Colorado.

The court is to exercise jurisdiction over the settlement of private land claims holding alternate sessions in Washington, and the states and territories designated. It is to have an attorney. The Wickham bill provides that "when the description of the land shall require the location to be ascertained by mountain ranges, mountain tops, forest, and the like natural objects, whereby or by any description thereof, the quantity of land in any such grant or concession is uncertain," said court shall declare and adjudge such claims or grant void, except as to that part of the land in such grant in actual possession of the grantee, or his assignees or legal representatives, at the date of the trouble of controversy.  
Petition is required to be made to the court within three years. Failure to comply invalidates a claim. Another striking feature of the bill is that no confirmation shall be made or patent issued for more than seven square leagues of land.

**Another Suicide at Denver.**  
DENVER, April 5.—E. A. Culver, whose wife resides at 83 Pearl Street, Cleveland, O., was found dead in a room of the Hamilton Hotel late tonight. Culver came here, from San Francisco, the first of the week, and, being out of money, pawned some clothes Friday afternoon, went to his hotel and engaged a room, which he immediately occupied. He locked the door, took half a bottle of morphine and then blew his brains out. The physician who examined the body after the room was broken into tonight says that he noticed shortly after going to his room Friday. Despondency and lack of money was the supposed cause.

**Denounces the Liquor Interest.**  
New York, April 5.—At the Methodist Episcopal conference today, Bishop Goodell, in an address, said that ministers should not sit on the fence waiting to make up their minds which way to go. The liquor traffic was roundly denounced. The Methodist Church, Bishop Goodell said, had no favor to ask from the liquor interests. It was emphatically proper that the Methodist church should lead in labor questions, as it was the church near the people.

**Ten For Nine.**  
BOSTON, April 5.—The three largest marble manufacturers of this city have notified their employees that on June 1st they will pay ten hours' wages for nine hours' work. The marble cutters believe the demand for the blue hour day will be generally granted without recourse to a strike.
