THE TICKET AGENTS.

Complete Program as Prepared for
Them by the U. S. W.

The local officials of the Rio Grande Western railway have prepared a very entertaining program for the three hundred or more delegates to the International Association of Ticket Agents who are expected to arrive here from the West tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock. The program includes the following information for the benefit of the visitors:

"For Warm Springs, Hot Springs, or Manitou, take street cars from R. & G. Depot. Buses at the depot will be free from 8:30 to 11 a. m. to all delegates wearing the association badge, and their wives."

"Between 11 and 12 o'clock, three miles from here, will be a magnificent view of the valley, lake and mountains may be obtained. Excursion cars to the grave of Brigham Young and to the temple and tabernacle, and to the office of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints."

"At 12 o'clock, an organ recital at the Tabernacle by Prof. Layton. 12 noon until 1:30 p. m., Hotel Knottford, Luncheon prepared by the Chamber of Commerce and the ladies' union of the city."

"At 1:30 p. m., for Salt Lake Beach. Take Salt Lake train, transferred by Salt Lake & Los Angeles railway and the Rio Grande Western railway. From the beach, the most magnificent sea water bathing resort in the world. Refreshments will be served on train. Return at 4 p. m. to R. & G. Depot. Leave for the Rio Grande Western special train for Goodwood Springs."

Board of Public Works.

The board of public works met last night, Chairman Dimes presiding. Hon. Thomas Marshall having qualified, all of the members were present. Considerable business was transacted, the most important of which was that the commissioners had been notified to prepare work on the city sewer on April 15th; that they had also to be a committee but that they were notified to see days additional. An order was made to the effect that Harrison prepared an order with attorney work on First Street between East Temple and Cotton Street, and that the board between the property across and the City Council should have been settled. The rain at Watson line, A. Hart for \$2,400 was sent back to the Council. But of nearly twenty applications for the position of sewerage inspector, John Smith was chosen at a salary of \$75 per month.

Religious Party.

At the first ward assembly room, Salt Lake City, one of the most pleasing meetings of the season was held last evening, the 15th inst., in honor of Elder Frederick Hendricks, one of the best preachers for a century in Great Britain. It was a regular Methodist improvement convention meeting, but the attendance was largely augmented by

the people of the ward who turned out on time and filled the house.

Remarks appropriate to the occasion were made by Elders Joseph W. Moore, president of the association; Elias Joseph H. Felt, state president of the Y. M. C. I. association; Bishop Joseph W. Hartman and Elder John T. Thayer, Vice President and Francis Hendricks, the last named being the father of the young missionary. The remarks were interspersed by readings and songs and instrumental music rendered by the talent of the ward and the Harmony Chorus club. In the singing, and the music of the singing instruments as well as organ, singers were called for in every instance and given. The time, who were somewhat late in arriving owing to filling into other appointments at different wards in the city on some of the same kind, were sent home by the police.

Elder Hendricks received substantial evidence of the good will of the people of the ward towards him, and also their feelings.

Police and Fire Matters.

The police and fire commissioners met last night, all of the members present except Jennings.

The appointment by Chief Pratt of George H. Dwyer as a member of the police force was confirmed. As to the appointment of policeman F. Kistner as assistant city engineer, the matter was referred to the city attorney for his opinion as to who had the right of appointment in that class of cases. The case of rates submitted by Chief Dwyer for the government of the fire department was not until the next meeting. The appointment of a new assistant city engineer, in the same position as the authority of appointments and appointments and the matter was referred to the city attorney for his opinion.
