Mr. Cummings presented the bill of Smith & Spencer for engrossing the constitution of 1882. Referred to the committee on claims and public accounts.

Petition of P. H. Emerson, for services on revision, amounting to such sum as the House thinks proper, was presented and referred to committee on appropriations.

W. H. Clark, assessor and collector of Sevier county, presented a petition for relief, amounting to \$500.

Mr. Morgan presented the claim of M. F. Cowley for clerical duties on the committee on education.

Mr. H. O. Crandall, by petition, asked \$116.35 relief as assessor and collector of Emery County. Read and referred to the committee on public accounts.

Mr. Brinton, from the committee on agriculture, submitted a report relative to the petition of Joseph Parker, reporting by bill; adopted.

Mr. Francis, from the committee on library, reported favorably on publishing a new catalogue, providing new shelving and disposal of old books, and an appropriation of \$1,000 to the library. Adopted.

Mr. Francis, from the committee on claims and public accounts, reported adversely to the claim of the DESERET NEWS Company for printing for the Constitutional Convention. Also, in favor of an appropriation to pay the claims of the Territorial Auditor. Report adopted and committee on appropriations instructed to include the amounts in their general bill.

Mr. Francis, from the committee on claims, reported favorably to appropriating \$100 to Harrison and \$500 to Jesse W. Fox.

A message was read from the Council, giving notice of the passage of C. F. 54, for assignments of insolvent debtors, which was read twice by title and referred to the committee on judiciary.

H. F. 78, to encourage and protect woolgrowers, was read.

Mr. Rider offered a resolution, the Council concurring, permitting the Territorial Librarian to exchange with other Territories and States desiring to do so, the laws and acts which may be published by this Assembly. Adopted.

H. F. No. 78, to encourage woolgrowers, read the second time by title; rules suspended, read third time and passed, 16 ayes, 5 nays.

C. F. No. 58, amending section 548, Compiled Laws, read third time and passed, 16 ayes, 1 nay.

A message from the Council was read giving notice of the passage of H. F. No. 77, amending the charter of Salt Lake City, with amendments. House concurred in the amendments, and the bill was ordered enrolled.

At 4:25 adjourned till 2 p. m., Saturday, March 8th.

A communication was received from the Council, giving notice of the passage of C. F. No. 61, a bill relating to the location and recording of mining claims. Read and referred to the committee on mines and mining.

The committee on municipal corporations and towns reported that the following bills have been enrolled and forwarded to the Governor for his action: H. F. 63, incorporating Spanish Fork City; H. F. 65, incorporating American Fork City; H. F. 64, incorporating the city of Lehi; H. F. 77, amending an act incorporating Salt Lake City; H. F. 71, providing for the payment of jurors.

A communication was received from the Council giving notice of the amending and passage of C. F. 64, C. F. 65, H. F. 60, and H. F. 70.

H. F. 64, a bill granting to Manti City certain powers, was read the first and second times, and placed on general file.

C. F. 65, amending city charter of Mount Pleasant, was read first and second time and placed on file for third reading.

H. F. 60, regulating civil procedure. Amendments by the Council considered, and were concurred in.

H. F. 70, relative to the building and operating of smelters. Amendments by the Council considered and concurred in.

H. F. 63, relative to the importation of diseased animals. Amendments of Council concurred in.

C. F. No. 50, amending sections 495 and 648, compiled laws, was considered, and a committee of conference asked for, in relation to the striking out of section 495.

Mr. Cummings presented a claim from J. H. Parry, for printing. Referred to the committee on claims and public accounts.

Mr. Hatch, for the committee on judiciary, to whom was referred H. F. No. 53, repealing section 103, chapter 7 compiled laws, reported adversely thereto. Adopted.

Same, to whom was referred C. F. 54, a bill providing for assignments of insolvent debtors, reported same back amended and recommended its passage. Adopted.

The committee on claims and public accounts, to whom was referred the petition of Adam Spiers, asking remuneration to the amount of \$610.55 for services rendered recommended that the same be not granted. Adopted.

Mr. Dusenbury, for the committee on ways and means, to whom was referred the communications of the Territorial treasurer and auditor in relation to the discrepancy in their accounts, reported that the reports of these officers are of sufficient importance to be made a matter of record.

Mr. Francis, from the committee on claims and public accounts, reported

adversely to the claims of Mr. Tanner, for penitentiary inspection \$100. O. H. Riggs \$500 for attendance at National Educational Convention at Baltimore, and of W. C. Spence \$100 for clerical labor on constitution.

A message was received from the Council giving notice of the passage of H. F. 20, relative to the branding of stock, etc., with amendments.

H. F. 75, regulating water rights, was read the third time and passed.

A message was received from the Council which gave notice of the passage of C. F. 67, relating to decedents.

C. F. No. 67, relating to estates of decedents, was read the first and second time and referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Thurman, for the committee on municipal corporations and towns, reported relative to H. F. No. 74, providing for the incorporation of towns of over 300 inhabitants, submitted a substitute.

C. F. No. 41, relative to private corporations, was made special order for next Monday.

Mr. Francis introduced H. F. No. 80, amending section 1, chapter 13, laws of 1880. Referred to the committee on elections.

Adjourned at 5:20 to 2 p. m. Monday.

### MEASURE FOR MEASURE.

THE failure to punish lawlessness in Georgia when "Mormon" Elders were mobbed and threatened and one innocent and irreproachable servant of God was foully murdered, has, as we predicted, produced evil results to society in that State. Let mobocracy run rampant against the "Mormons," and it will soon break out in other directions, and those who encourage or wink at it in one case will be sure to have their hands full of it in others.

A riot has occurred in Lowndes County, Georgia, which has caused terror in that region. After many many deeds of violence, a desperado named Farner was arrested, when between twenty and thirty of his associates in turbulence took possession of Alapaha, the town where he was confined, defied the city authorities and demanded Farner's release. The prisoner was finally set at liberty with the agreement that he would appear for trial on the 15th of the present month.

This was a compromise with the mobocrats. The law was not powerful enough to sustain its own rights. Violence was placed on equal terms with authority. When the mob departed they fired their weapons in defiance, and it is feared that when the trial takes place there will be a renewal

of these lawless demonstrations. This is a small taste of the treatment administered to and permitted, toward the "Mormons." And the end is not yet.

### TAKING IT ALL BACK.

A CLEVELAND Leader correspondent relates that at a dinner in Cincinnati Matthew Arnold remarked that American women looked pale, unhappy and careworn. A lady at his side said: "If you look about you, Mr. Arnold, you will see that the ladies here to-day are as fair, care free and happy as it is possible for people to be." The teacher of lucidity raised his eyeglass and, gazing critically, said in a surprised tone: "Well, upon my soul, Mrs. Arnold is the only careworn one in the room."

This reminds us of the remarks made by visitors to Utah in reference to "Mormon" women. People come here filled with prejudice and ready to echo the sayings of previous prattlers, and in describing the place and people say either that the women are sad and sorrowful, or ugly and forbidding in appearance; in one case making the women martyrs, in the other the men, for if called sad they are pronounced in bondage, and if called ugly, merit is accorded to the men for marrying them.

We have been frequently amused in noticing these remarks and in scanning the countenances of those who utter them. For some of the most careworn, cadaverous, crabbed and "home-ly" females have come here and looked upon our ladies with the green goggles of prejudice, that we have seen in any country. If they were only as candid as Mr. Arnold was after making his hackneyed expression and taking a look at his wife, all they would need would be to look in the glass and they would be ready to recant.

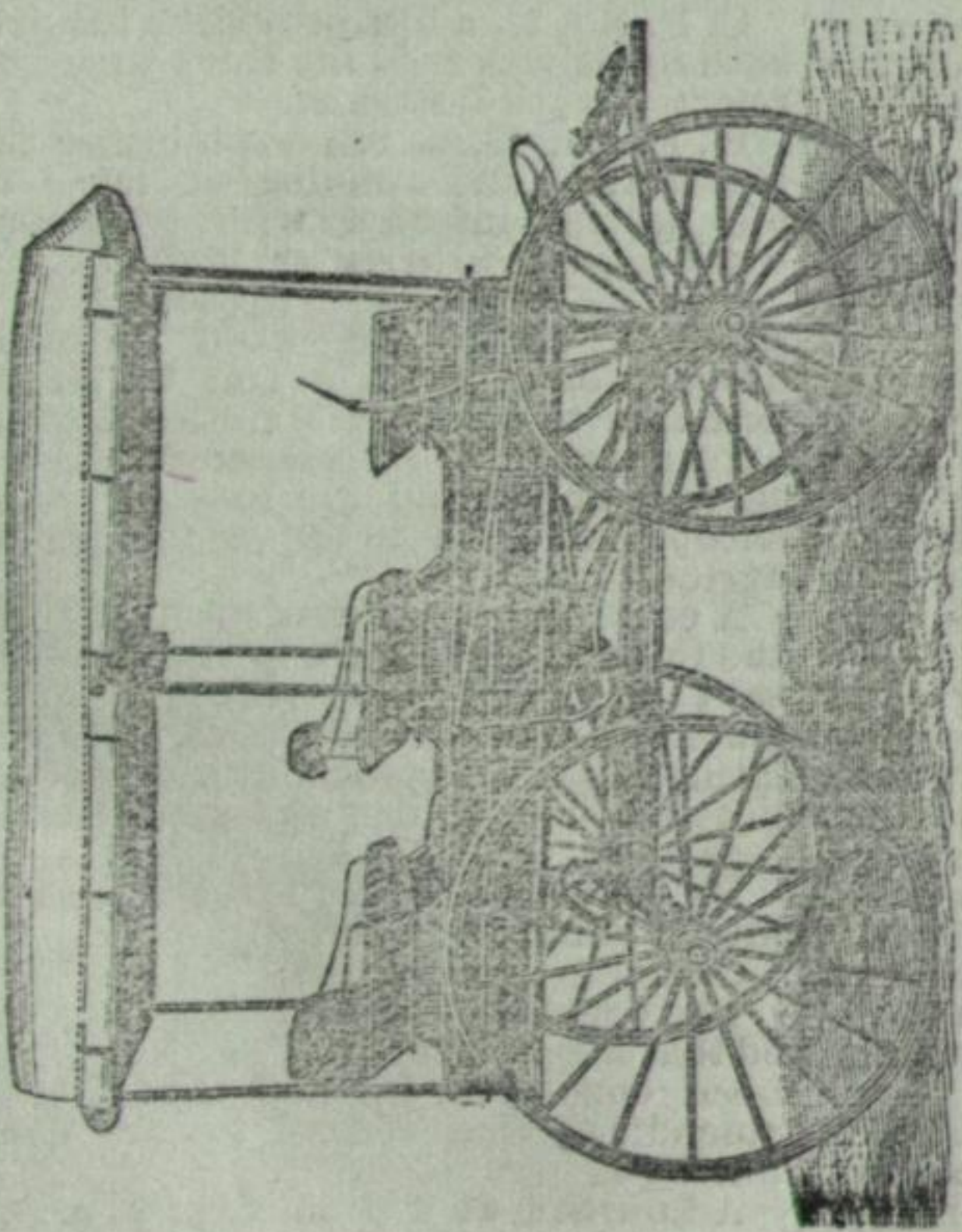
