Sought to Show Orchard Has a Mania For Boasting of Crimes Non-Existent Except in His Own Mind.

Boise, Ida., June 10 .- Into the further cross-examination of Harry Orhard today counsel for William D. Haywood repeatedly threw the suggestion of a great counter-conspiracy, formulated and carried out by the enemies of the Western Federation of Miners, and indicated a determination to construct their main line of defense on that field, They carried Orchard by slow steps and through the minutest details from the dynamiting of the Indetails from the dynamiting of the In-dependence station down to the attempt on the life of Fred Bradley and his family, and in addition to a series of particular attacks on the credibility of the witness and the general probabil-ity of his stories, and preparing the way for their own testimony in rebutal, they sought to show that Orchard has a mania for boasting of the commission of crimes non-existent except in his own mind, and that he is testifying un-der the control and suggestion of De-tective McParland. They began today by making it clear

tective McParland. They began today by making it clear that as fas as Orchard knew of his own knowledge. Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone had nothing to do with the inspiration, planning and execution of the Vindicator explosion, and that Hay-wood and Moyer had nothing to do with planning of the murder of Detec-

ve Gregory.
