ENDORSE ALL HIS POLICIES.

Charge Guggenhelm With Buying Seat in Senate and Say Taft's Against Sugar Beet Industry

Pueblo, Sept. 10.-The platform adopted by the Democratic convention yesterday pledges the support of Colorado Democrats to Bryan and Kern; favors a state law for the regulation and control of railroads on the lines of federal, interstate commerce acts; declares for a state guarantee fund for state banks; demands prohibition of ownership of stock of one corporation by another, this provision to extend to foreign corporations; charges Senator Guggenheim with buying his seat in the United States senate, and urges election of United States senators by direct vote of the people. Forest reserves on real forest are commended, but the planting of them is condemned. The administration of forest serve under state and local control is demanded. The platform also demands the exclusion of agricultural and unforested areas from the reserves, the dismissal of employes in the service, and declares the whole thing an effort to build up a political machine.

of the present system of timber sale, and of forestry laws concerning administration of forest reserves is deministration of forest reserves is demanded, and the leasing of the public domain opposed. Reduction of the tariff schedules in conformity with the national Democratic platform is favored. The policy of William H. Taft is declared to be against the sugar beet industry and in the interest of Asiatic labor. Other planks favor good roads legislation; a direct primary law: a constitutional amendprimary law; a constitutional amend-ment establishing initiative and refer-endum on the Oregon plan; municipal ownership of public utilities, and the Australian ballot.

The platform concludes as follows: "With abiding faith in the statesmanship, the patriotism, and the capacity of William J. Bryan, and in the right of the people to rule, and with a firm belief in the success of our cause as exemplified in this declaration of principles, we appeal with confidence to the wisdom and enlightened judgment of the people of our beloved commonwealth and bespeak their suffrages in our behalf."

TO STUDY STARS FOR YEARS IN SO. AMERICA

San Francisco, Sept. 10.—With Prof. Lewis Eoss and Robert Varnum of the Dudley observatory at Albany, N. Y., Prof. R. H. Tucker of the Lick observatory has departed for South America to undertake the task of observing and cataloging the southern stars, numbering upwards of 25,000, that are of merit in astronomical eyes. A temporary observatory is to be built in the Agentine republic at San Luis on the edge of the Andean plateau, and here for four or five years to come, the scientists will keep nightly vigil. The remote locality was selected because of the clear nights and the pure atmosphere. The expedition is undertaken under the direction of the Carnegie Institute at Washington.

New York, Sept. 10.—Notices of an offer of 1,000 crowns for the discovery of return of a Van Dyck which was stolen recently from a gallery in Vienna are being sent out to all customs in spectors and art dealers from the Austro-Hungarian consulate-general in this city. The painting "Kopf Eines Kinred" (Head of a Child) was cut from frame in the gallery of Count Marrach, in Vienna, on the forenoon of Aug. 24.

A day or two later a cable message was received at the consulate from the prefect of police in Vienna, saying that Count Marrach had offered 1,000 crowns for the return of the painting. A photograph of it has been received here and printed ratice announcing the theft and offer of reward. Within a few minutes after the bell carried its message, nearly 1.000 members of the congregation, most of whom the Italians, had gathered in the church and on the lawn in front of the rectory, praying for the repose of the soul of their beloved pastor. More than one of them repeated the story of Father Brophy's prayer on the occasion of the disastrous fire that almost wiped out Coney Island eight years ago, just after he went there as a young priest to establish the first Catholic church in the resort section of Coney Island.

Faher Brophy had taken a dance-hall and had transformed it into a church, in which he had built up in a few months a large congregation which included most of the Catholic amusement vendors there. On the night of the fire, when the flames, driven by a heavy wind from the ocean, had swept most of the south side of Surf avenue and was threatening the north side, and the cuilding containing Father Brophy's church, he knelt in the middle of Surf avenue and prayed that the wind charge its course. Within a short time the wind swung around to the north and carried the flames back over the devastated district.

"LABOR" CASE POST-PONED FOR TWO WEEKS

Washington, Sept. 9.-The legal proceedings against President Samuel Gompers, Secy. Frank Morrison and John Mitchell, of the American Federation of Labor, in which they were charged with contempt of the su-

eration of Labot, in which they were charged with contempt of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, on account of acts and utterances apropos of the judgment of that court, directing them to cease publishing the name of the Buck Stove & Range company in the "We don't patronize list," were virtually postponed for two weeks after a brief hearing today. Justice Gould, of the supreme court presided.

The postponement was taken at the instance of counsel for the stove company. It was stated on behalf of the company that it would be necessary to examine witnesses as to the issues made by the petition and the answers, and Justice Gould, saying that he saw no necessity for great haste, granted the request. He appointed an examiner to take testimony, gave each side 30 days and announced his willingness to sit in the case after the facts shall have been ascertained. Judge Alton B. Parker took an active part in presenting the defense of Messrs, Gompers, Morrison and Mitchell, He took occasion to indicate that he had not sanctioned the application made in behalf of his clients for a jury trial and in behalf of his fellow counsel as well as for himself, withdrew that application.

Chicago, Sept. 10.-Cihcago is to have a Kosher hospital. This was determined at an enthusiastic meeting of orthodox Jews held at the B'Nai Moshe temple, last night. Ten thousand dollars was subscribed, and the organization of the hospital will begin at once. According to the rabbi's doctors and laymen who addressed the meeting, the lack of such a hospital has caused large numbers of orthodox Jews either to lose their faith or die for it. The leaders of the 8,000 orthodox Jews of Chicago expressed themselves as determined to stop this drain on their numbers andl martyrdom of their noblest co-religionists. The new hospital will be known as the Mimonidas Kosher hospital of Chicago, and will probably be located close to the West Side Ghetto, where the majority of the orthodox Jews live. ALBERTI SPENT FIVE MILLION

Thousands of Peasants Suffer Through Dishonesty of Minister of Justice.

ONE BANK LOSES \$1,500,000

Falsification of Books Began Fourteen Years Ago, Money Lost in American Mines.

Copenhagen, Sept. 9.-The downfail of M. Alberti, the former minister of Justice, who yesterday surrendered to the police and confessed to a series of frauds against the Bondestandes Sparkasse, a savings bank of which he was president, will be felt the keenest by those who were his most ardent admirers and supporters. The exact amount involved through Alberti's fraudulent operations and embezzlements is estimated at five million dollars, the Danish Farmer's Butter Export association alone suffering a loss of \$1,500,000, while wide-spread ruin has been caused among thousands of peasants from whom the former minister of justice derived his power.

The minister of finance even now is considering the advisability of the state assisting the ruined depositors.

According to Alberti's own story, he began falsifying the accounts of the bank in 1894, seven years before he was appointed minister of justice.

The bulk of the money and his own fortune were lost, he says, through speculations in various American gold mines.

M. Alberti who made his confession M. Alberti who made his confession with the utmost calmness, maintains his tranquil demeanor.

A recent meeting of the shareholders of the savings bank of which Alberti was president, revealed the fact that for several years the affairs of the bank had not been properly scrutinized by the accountants.

OFFICIALS BLAMED FOR MILLION DOLLAR FIRE

New York, Sept. 9.—Julius Lipp, manager of Abe Wolf, seretary and treasurer of the Central Glass company of New Orleans, and John Eckert, an employe of that company, were tonight indicted by the grand jury on the charge of arson in connection with a fire which about 10 days ago, burned over a portion of three blocks in the business section of New Orleans causing a loss of \$1,500,000. The fire originated in the building occupied by the Central Glass company.

RAIN PUTS OUT FIRE.

Hibbing, Minn., Sept. 2.—A steady rain began to fall this evening, the first in two weeks, soaking the brushwood and cuttings which have furnished the most ready fuel for the forest fire on the range. The rain at Hibbing practically means the end of the forest fire and the heavy clouds that are coming from the east and south seem to cover the greater part of the range.

RACE RIOTS IN BOHEMIA.

Nace Riots in Boneaux.

Vienna, Sept. 2.—Serious race conflicts are reported at Bergreichenstein, a town of Bohemia, in connection with the meeting of German-Boehmeruald association. A number of German delegates, it is reported, were promenading the streets when the district commissioner ordered the gendarmes to disperse them. Many of the Germans were injured, three of them fatally. Later the commissioner summoned the dragoons, who rode down the people, injuring many more. The Germans have entered a protest to their government.

ADVOCATES ECONOMY.

Tokio, Sept. 10.—Marquis Katsura, the new primer and minister of finance, outlined a policy of rigid economy for Japan in an address tonight before the Bankers' club. He declared that the patriotism of the people of Japan was as necessary now, when economy was necessary to restore credit and confidence as it was during the Russian-Japanese war, when he was foreign minister. Upon returning to office, the marquis declared, he had found the economic and financial conditions of the government and the people as yet unrestored and it was therefore absolutely necessary that the government and the people unite in a common effort in the national interest.

DEFENDANT IS DEAD, FORGOTTEN SUIT ALIVE

New York, Sept. 10.—After a lapse of 30 years, action has been taken to have dismissed a suit brought against the late General Benjamin F. Butler, of Massachusetts, by John H. Lester, who sought to recover \$100,000 damages for alleged false improsonment in 1864. In its time the action attracted widespread attention, but it had long since been forgotten and was revived only by the unexpected unearthing of some old records bearing upon it by United States district attorney, Stimson.

When General Butler was in command of the department of Virginia and North Carolina, in 1864, he was called upon by Lester, who wished to have his family passed through the lines on a flag of truce. While he was talking with the general he was recognized by one of the latter's subordinates as a spy. He was taken into custody and incrimminating documents were found upon him as a result of which he was tried by a commission and soft to a military prison. As long afterwards at 1818, Lester brought two suits against General Butler. One of thees was thrown out of court and the other never came to trial.

While going through the old papers in his office, Mr. Stimson found those bearing on the second suit, and he applied to the United States circuit court yesterday to have it dismissed on account of death of Goneral Butler, which occurred in 1893. As Lester had not been heard of in 20 years the probability is that he is also dead. It will be necessary, however, to dig up some minor papers bearing upon the case before the formal dismissal can be entered on the records.
