COUNCIL WILL KEEP CHAMBERS

Concludes to Retain Services of The City's Most Notorious Policeman.

GAMBLING HOUSE RESORTS.

Afro-Americans Speak Both For and Against Accused and Petition for Removal is Filed.

The colored population of the city to the number of about 20 turned out last night at the meeting of the city council committees and appeared before the police committee in regard to the petition asking for the removal of the colored police officer, W. H. Chambers, The majority of those present opposed Chambers but several spoke in his behalf also. The charges made against Chambers were not regarded as proved by the protestants so the members of the committee voted unanimously to file the petition and thus exonerated the colored officer.

STATEMENT OF PROTEST.

Henry Bogan made the opening fatement in behalf of the protestants. said that Chambers was not the ple in the city, but that he represented the tough element. He charged that he ured his endorsements by false representations as the petition for his ap-pointment contained no name and those who presented it for signature informed the colored people that the petition was for Mr. Howell, who was also an aspirant for the appointment.

IN NOTORIOUS JOINTS. The speaker also charged that

Chambers spent most of his time in the colored clubs run by Bruce Johnson and Ed Hatfield and that he pro-tected those joints and run colored men out of town that would not pat-ronize those places. Bogan told of an instance when Chambers sat beside him in Bruce Johnson's gambling joint and saw Bruce deal him a crooked hand in "Black Jack" and beat him out of his money. RUNS THEM OUT.

Two other colored men spoke along the same line and declared that Cham-bers did not represent the best class of colored people and that he was run-ning colored men out of town who should not be prosecuted. One of them remarked that if a colored man would not give Chambers his "bit" he was run out of town. DEFENDED CHAMBERS.

One man spoke in behalf of Cham-bers and denied that the officer did ot represent the best class of his peowanted him on the force and hoped he would stay there. Inasmuch as the charges against Chambers charges against Chambers were not backed up by any proof other than general statements, and as Chief Sheets was satisfied with the work of Chambers, the committee decided to file the petition and thus close the matter.
