Said to be Using Oleomargarine-Complaint of Food Commissioner.

Moroni Heiner, the state dairy and food commissioner is camping on the trail of some of the hotels in this city, which, he says, are using oleomargarine. He has submitted evidence to County Attorney Christensen against one hotel and asked that official to prosecute the offending hostelry. Mr. Christensen says that he will investigate the matter, and if sufficient evidence can be found to warrant it, h will institute proceedings. Mr. Hainer says that he took a piece of the article that this hotel is using for but-ter and had if analyzed by a competent chemist who pronounced it oleo-margarine. While under the new law they are permitted to use it they are required to make their guests aware of its use in the hotel. Furthermore they are not permitted to color it.

VARIOUS COURT CASES.

The Supreme court has reversed the lower court's ruling in the case of George W. Lambourne vs. John Halfin, appellant, in which the jury granted Lambourne \$1,650, on the ground of misconduct of the jurors, two of them Barton Snarr and Philander Butler, Jr., having made affidavit that the amount of damages was fixed by dividing the total of the amounts fixed by each juror as reasonable damages by the number of jurors. Justice Bartch wrote the opinion Justice Baskin concurring, District Judge Rollapp disented.

The Supreme court has affirmed the ower court in its decision regarding the Fred J. Leonard-Lucin L. Woodruff case which was appealed by Woodruff et. al. The decree requires defendants to deliver a deed to certain Salt Lake real estate in exchange for some real property at Mercur. The opinion is written by Justice Baskin, Justice Bartch and District Judge Hart concurring.
