All spoke of the upright, faithful life of the deceased.

Mrs. Fisher was born in the state of New York, April 18, 1821, joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1839, and emigrated to Salt Lake City in 1852 with her husband, Rufus Fisher. She had a mother of seven boys and two girls. Seven children survive her.
