Fires.—Yesterday, two fires occurred in the wheat-fields along the route of the Utah and Northern Railroad, resulting from the flying sparks of the engine. The first was between Hyde Park and Logan, the other, just above Mendon, Cache County. The train was stopped promptly each time, and the road employees worked vigorously, until the flames were extinguished. The extreme heat of the weather, and the close proximity of the dry wheat shocks to the railroad, renders such accidents momentarily liable.

since that time has pursued a course of professional study in the east.

The election in Utah County passed off very smoothly, but only a meagre vote was cast. The people's candidates for territorial and county officers received votes ranging from 2,042 to 2,056.

The people of Utah County are agitating the question of purchasing the railroad in Spanish Fork Cañon, and extending it to the coal fields in Pleasant Valley.

A New Movement.—The latest movement, of a mutual improvement character, is being inaugurated under the name of Primary Mutual Improvement Associations, whose design is the education and general advancement of children too young to be instructed under the present system of mutual improvement, established among the young people throughout the Territory. The prime movers in this idea are Sisters Aurelia Rogers and Ediza R. Snow, the latter now travelling through the settlements of Cache Valley, striving to awaken an interest for the project in the minds of the people. The design is to establish societies in every ward of every settlement, to be presided over by teachers of either sex, whose duty will be to instruct their pupils in everything that is good and useful, temporally and spiritually, carrying out the idea of the mutual improvement associations already organized, as far as is consistent with the capacity of the mind of childhood, as well as introducing such things as may seem better adapted to the difference in circumstances and conditions.

To render the association so attractive and enjoyable that children will prefer to attend than otherwise, is one of the prime considerations. The movement has our hearty encouragement, and we hope to see it flourish. Parents should co-operate with the inaugurators of this philanthropic idea, and do all they can for the safety and general welfare of their children, for whose future they are, to a great extent, responsible.
