GRASSHOPPERS AND SOWING.—We have received the following from an intelligent friend, on a subject of very great interest to the people of this Territory at the present time:—

SALT LAKE CITY, March 9th, 1868.

EDITOR DESERET EVENING NEWS:

SIR:—In view of the apprehended ravages of the grasshoppers this season, I would wish to state for the benefit of those who may not possess a knowledge of the fact, that of all cereals peas are the least liable to destruction by these destructive insects, as may be proven by the testimony of those who have tried it here.

When the grasshoppers made such ravages in Minnesota in the years of 1856 and 1857, it was found that though these voracious insects devoured every thing before them, even to peeling the saplings in the forest, they did not eat the pea vine. Besides the advantage of being a sure crop, they are also a profitable grain for feeding hogs and other animals, and the yield per acre is remunerative.
