## FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

CONGRESSIONAL HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 19.—Blackburn, from the committee on rules, submitted a unanimous report on the revision of the rules. The consideration of the report is made a special order for the 6th of January, and from day to day thereafter to the exclusion of every other order.

The Speaker appointed as a committee on Inter-oceanic Canal, Messrs. King, (chairman) Singleton, Whitworth, Martin, of Ohio, Turner, Nicholas, Hutchinson, Page, Conger, Frye and Haskell.

The committee on public buildings have agreed to report favorably on the appropriation of \$700,000 for public buildings at Pittsburgh.

A communication was received from the President to the Senate and the House, enclosing a bill to provide for the reclamation of marshes in the harbor of the city of Washington and Georgetown, and for other purposes, together with an accompanying letter of the President of the Senate, requesting its transmission to Congress. The bill embraces a plan for the reclamation of the marshes of the Potomac river and its eastern branch. The President urges that Washington should be made as healthy as possible, and said this was regarded as an essential branch of the work.

Adrien asked leave to offer a resolution for the appointment of a select committee to inquire into the claims of United States citizens against the Government of Nicaragua; objected.

Kenna, from the committee on commerce reported a bill known as the steamboat bill, which was made a special order for the second Tuesday in February.

The House then adjourned till Jan. 6th.

## EASTERN.

Capital Notes.

WASHINGTON, 19.—Less than a quorum of Senators and barely a quorum of Representatives were in their seats at the Capitol to-day, and the country is expected to be in session on the 6th of January, after very brief sessions. The outgoing trains to-day were well filled with departing members, and by tomorrow morning two-thirds of both houses will have left Washington to spend Christmas holidays at their respective homes. Senator Farley has gone to New York City to join his family. Governor Pacheco goes there tomorrow for the same purpose. Senator Booth left for New York to-day with the intention of remaining in that city during most of the holiday recess, although he may return here for New Year's day. Representative Page will also go to New York tomorrow for a visit of a week or two. Congressmen Davis and Berry will probably remain here throughout the recess.

Senator Hamlin has introduced a bill for the relief of the children of the late General James H. Carleton, well known to the Pacific Coast, which proposes to pay them \$7,000 for the value of certain property destroyed in New Mexico by order of General Canby, during the early part of the war of the rebellion.

Delegate Otero has introduced into the House of Representatives a duplicate of a bill recently described in these dispatches, which was introduced by Edmunds in the Senate, providing for the adjudication of all unsettled private land claims in Colorado, Nevada and the Territories acquired from Mexico.

The House has passed Delegate Maginnis' bill to create a new land district, consisting of all that portion of Montana east of the 27th range east of the principal meridian, with the land office at Miles City.

Delegate Brewster has introduced a bill for the creation of a North-western land district in the Territory of Idaho, with a land office at Port Townsend. It is to comprise all that portion of the territory west of the Cascade mountains and north of the line of the 43rd parallel.

Judge Morrison, Chief Justice elect of the California Supreme Court, left for the Pacific Coast to-day, after a visit of one day in this city.

The principal changes made by the committee on revision of the rules of the House are as follows: The committee abolish the present system of the call of the committees which gives to each committee two morning hours in which to dispose of its business, and in lieu thereof proposes that all reports of committees which are submitted in the morning hour be referred to the calendar without action.

Provision is given to bills in committee of the whole on the state of the Union, or raising revenue or general appropriation bills, and when the business of the calendar is disposed of in order, subject to a decision of the House when objection is made to the consideration of a bill. A new calendar is created, called the House calendar, to which are referred all public bills not appropriating money.

No change is made in regard to the private calendar except that the "objection" and "consideration" days are wiped out; all bills being considered in their regular order. The right to report a bill time conferred upon the committee on banking and currency, coinage and weights and measures, at last session is revoked, and they are called as other committees; only the committees on elections, appropriations, printing accounts and enrolled bills possess the right to report at any time.

The only important change made with respect to the powers and duties of committees is to take from the committee on commerce the river and harbor bill, after it is matured and refer it to the committee on appropriations for revision, as to law, to be appropriated for specific purposes. The commerce committee for some years past, without authority or rule, has reported annually.

The Erie Commission.

DESNEY, 19.—A special do to the Tribune, from the Erie Commission, dated 18th, says: The commission, consisting of Gen. Hatch and Lieut. Valer, is patiently awaiting the arrival of the prisoners. Nothing has been heard from Gen. Hatch since his departure for the camp of the White River. Utes on the 15th. He felt confident of his ability to secure the prisoners and return to the agency by the 21st inst. There is a strong war feeling existing among both the Uncomphgre and White River Utes, which may prevent the surrender of the parties demanded.

The reported conversation between a New York World reporter and Gen. McCook, of General Sherman's staff, in which he says that if he had been there he would have taken the Indian prisoners without waiting any longer, is decidedly untrue. A question arises, which, perhaps the distinction

guished officer can answer. There are 17 white men, commission and escort in a long building with 25 armed Indians, the building surrounded by over 200 more. By what military stratagem would Gen. McCook have surrounded the Indians and taken 12 of their number prisoners?

Seymour and the Presidency.

CHICAGO, 19.—A Utica special gives an interview with Seymour. The reporter asked him if he would accept the democratic nomination for president if such course seemed necessary for the party's success. He said "as for myself, I do not think there is a general disposition to nominate me nor do I think it wise to do so for many reasons. I should not be a strong candidate and have said so to several invitations to make addresses upon political or other subjects. This would of itself be a good reason why I should not be elected even if nominated, while my personal popularity of I don't consider it anything more than the speculations of the day in a time of political uncertainty. In the face of what has been said, it is absurd to suppose I shall be nominated. I have no idea that I shall be nominated by any convention for president. I should be guilty of self-complacency which would be ridiculous, if I thought a great party was anxious to make me a candidate against my wishes. Even in that impossible event I should do my friends a very great wrong if I should go on a ticket with the knowledge that I was the wrong man in the position."

Strike at the Stockyards.

The trouble at the stockyards remains in statu quo. Five thousand men are idle, and but 3,000 are at work in the various packing houses, where none but members of the Union are employed. The whole affair is probably merely a movement of the packers to depress the price of hogs and enhance the value of provisions.

Kearney's Talk.

Dennis Kearney passed through here this afternoon en route to Boston. He talked voluminously to reporters, but advanced little new. He said he was a little downcast, reporters since one in San Francisco recently had not hesitated to persecute himself. He did not know when the Workingmen would hold their national convention. That would be settled at the conference in Washington on Jan. 8th. He would be there and present his views. The Workingmen wanted to get a man whom the democrats would support. Their choice was Thurman. Thought he would carry the country if supported by workingmen and democrats. Thurman was not his individual preference; if he had the power, he would put Weaver, of Iowa, into the Presidential chair. The workingmen of California have another choice than Thurman. He came first, but Judge McIndley, of the Supreme Court, was a very popular second choice. Thurman was an honest man. That was shown by his action in the National Bank matter.

"Was he (Kearney) a green-backer?"

"Yes sir; a rabid one, at that."

He said De Young was sure to go to the penitentiary. Certainly, Kallach would prosecute him, or, if he didn't, he (Kearney) would. The feeling against De Young had not subsided; it was just as bitter and intense as ever. He expects to be back in Chicago in five weeks. Should not come back until after the conference. Shouldn't say that the convention be held in Chicago.
