tres and other places of public amusement may sell tickets to specified seats, and which tickets shall not be transferable if the words "not transferable" are writwords "not transferable" are writ-ten or printed thereon, and in the presentation of any ticket so mark-ed by any other than the person to whom the same was sold, the proprietor of such place or his au-thorized agent may, after tending the price of such ticket, refuse the holder thereof admission, and any person holding a ticket so transfer-red who shall refuse to receive the mony. red who shall refuse to receive the price of such ticket when tendered, or who shall claim or demand the right of admission on such ticket
