Under the heading "A Piece of Pre-umption," the Provo Enquirer of Wed- warned against the erratic foilies of the sumption," the Provo Enquirer of Wedconceited individual who poses as the secretary of the State board of health. nesday evening has the following point-"There is no apparent reason for the revolutionary methods sought to be ined and timely editorial;

"The people of this city were astounded yesterday by the announcement made that a Dr. Beatty, reputed secretary of the State board of health, residing at Salt Lake City, had "ordered" Dr. F. W.s Taylor, city quarantine physician, to see that all schools of whatever character or under whatever jurisdiction, shall be closed to teachers and children who have not been vac-

clinated within the past seven years, and this "order" is to take effect on January 1st next. "It is reported that Dr. Taylor has replied to the autocratic secretary that his "order" will be executed. We trust this is a false report. There is a board of health in this city, from whom Dr. Taylor should take his orders, and not in advance at least, from any other

The order, even if regular, is unwarranted by the condition of affairs in this city. There is no epidemic of the fancled smallpox in Provo. There are reported here a few isolated cases of so-called smallpox, but why the schools should be "ordered" closed because of a few cases of that nature is a mystery to the people of this city. There has not yet developed a single case in connection with the schools, and if all re-ports are reliable, there is not a shadow of reason for supposing that any smallpox development is lickly to trise there in the immediate future. The two thousand or more children are pursuing their studies apparently un-conscious of the existence of an epidemic of any description, real or imag-

inary The action of Dr. Beatty, so far as "The action of Dr. Beatty, so far as Provo is concerned, is an assumption unwaranted by law or conditions, and Dr. Taylor should have repudiated the "order" from that source. Dr. Tay-lor's duty is to the local authorities; it is from them, and them only, that he is expected to take his instructions.
