EXPIRES WHILE BATHING.
A. M. Fillmore Dies Suddenly at the County Infirmary.

A. M. Fillmore, aged 40, died suddenly at the county infirmary, last evening, while being given a bath by an attendant. Fillmore was at the Commercial street mission yesterday afternoon, when about 5 o'clock he was seized with severe pains in his spine. County Physician Anderson had him sent to the infirmary. The use of some soap and water was painfully apparent, and while the ablutions were in progress, the unfortunate man fell over in an unconscious condition and expired. Fillmore was born in Iowa, and came to Utah several years ago. He leaves a wife and several children in the southern part of the State. He often appeared before the police court, and two years ago he was sent from the county jail to the infirmary, suffering with a carbuncle on his neck.

NEW CENTURY MEETING.
Two Plans Being Considered by Committee Appointed on Arrangements.

Governor Wells and Mayor Thompson have expressed a willingness to further the watch meeting on New Year's eve in every possible way. The committee appointed to confer with the Governor and Mayor, waited upon those gentlemen yesterday afternoon, with the result stated.

Two plans have been suggested, either of which might be made a great success. The first is to hold the watch meetings as outlined by the National Red Cross society, and the second is to hold a union service on New Year's morning, when all the churches of the city could unite. Several churches, it is believed, will hold service on that morning, and the idea of a union service has been approved to quite a few.

The Tabernacle is considered the most desirable place for such a meeting, whether it be in the morning or evening, and steps will be taken to secure the co-operation of the ministers and church authorities of the city to carry out the plan.

SURRENDERS HIS LIFE.
A. B. Cutler, the Gambler, Dies of Congestion of the Lungs.

A. B. Cutler, or "Old Cut," a sobriquet given him by his friends in the sporting world, died Wednesday afternoon at the home of his brother, 150 east Third South street. He has been living in Eureka for some time, where he conducted a gambling house, coming here to nurse his brother, who recently sustained an operation, he contracted the pneumonia and his aged frame succumbed to the disease. He was a popular among his class because he did not brook others with his troubles. He was a habitual gambler, and his face whether he won or lost, and his droll humor made him a capital raconteur. In the early days of the West he was wealthy and engaged in business that has a better rating in society than gambling, but when ill-advised speculation took his means, he turned to the latter occupation, remaining a gambler up to the end. His funeral will be held from S. D. Evans' undertaking parlors Saturday afternoon.

QUITS FIRE DEPARTMENT.
Lewis Lewison, who has been employed in the Salt Lake City fire department for the past three years, has tendered his resignation, in connection with the department yesterday. Mr. Lewison leaves for Sandy in the morning where he will engage in the mercantile business. Chief Devine said Mr. Lewison was the swiftest ladderman in his employ.

SOLD A SALOON.
R. D. McDonald Wants \$451.08 for Selling the Onyx Bank.

R. D. McDonald has filed a suit against the Onyx Bank company and John McNally in the Third district court to recover \$451.08 alleged to be due plaintiff on account of certain services rendered the defendants.

The complaint alleges that on August 1st, 1897, plaintiff commenced work for the defendants at their request to secure a purchaser for the Onyx Bank saloon, on west Second South street, and continued in their employment for a period of five days. No fixed price was agreed on for the services, but plaintiff says the defendants promised to pay him on demand, a sum his services were reasonably worth. Plaintiff further says that he performed all of the condition of the employment, and that on August 5th, 1897, the sale of the saloon property was consummated for the defendants by plaintiff for the sum of \$9,021.71. McDonald says the part he played in the negotiations leading up to the sale was reasonable, and worth the amount he now seeks judgment for.

FOLLIES OF A CONCEITED DOCTOR

How He Transcended the Law—State Board of Health Secretary Has No Business to Order Schools Closed—Provo Doctor Bungles Too.

Under the heading "A Piece of Pre-sumption," the Provo Enquirer of Wednesday evening has the following pointed and timely editorial:

"The people of this city were astonished yesterday by the announcement made that a Dr. Beatty, reputed secretary of the State board of health, residing at Salt Lake City, had 'ordered' Dr. F. W. Taylor, city quarantine physician, to see that all schools of whatever character or under whatever jurisdiction, shall be closed to teachers and children who have not been vaccinated within the past seven years, and this 'order' is to take effect on January 1st next."

"It is reported that Dr. Taylor has replied to the autocratic secretary that his 'order' will be executed. We trust this is a false report. There is a board of health in this city, from whom Dr. Taylor should take his orders, and not in advance at least, from any other source."

"The order, even if regular, is unwarranted by the condition of affairs in this city. There is no epidemic of the feared smallpox in Provo. There are reported here a few isolated cases of so-called smallpox, but why the schools should be 'ordered' closed because of a few cases of that nature is a mystery to the people of this city. There has not yet developed a single case in connection with the schools, and if all reports are reliable, there is not a shadow of reason for supposing that any such development is likely to arise there in the immediate future. The two thousand or more children are pursuing their studies apparently unconscious of the existence of an epidemic of any description, real or imaginary."

"The action of Dr. Beatty, so far as Provo is concerned, is an assumption unwarranted by law or conditions, and Dr. Taylor should have repudiated the order from that source. Dr. Taylor's duty is to the local authorities; it is from them, and them only, that he is expected to take his instructions. The public have no knowledge of the city board of health taking any steps of this character, or even considering them officially or under the requirements of the city ordinances."

"The Enquirer is a vigorous defender of law and order, and believes in the strictest and most effective regulations for the prevention of contagious diseases among the people. It commends Dr. Taylor for his zeal and services in this connection."
