This plan has been tried with great success in the fen districts near Rochefort, France, and the authorities of Holland assert that intermittent fever has entirely disappeared from districts where the sunflowers have been planted.

A singular method of making butter has lately come into quite extensive use in France. The process consists in placing the cream in a linen bag of moderate thickness, which is carefully closed; then burying the bag about a foot and a half deep in the earth, and allowing it to remain from twenty-four to twenty-eight hours. After the expiration of this period the cream is found to have become hard, and it is then broken up by means of a wooden beater into small pieces, and enough water poured upon it to wash out the butter-milk. To prevent any mixture of earth it is advisable to enclose the bag in a second one of larger size and coarser quality.

An exchange says: The common notion that the sect called "The Friends" is dwindling away is incorrect. During the past year the orthodox branch of the society received fifteen hundred new members. There are now twelve yearly meetings: nine in this country, and one each in Canada, Ireland and England. The society is growing quite rapidly in the West. They have three colleges in this country, viz.: Haverford College, in Pennsylvania, Earlham College, in Richmond, Ind., and Whitier College, in Salem, Iowa.

The celebrated Thames Tunnel at London has finally been closed as a public footway. This underground, which at the time of its design was considered a masterpiece of science, and which formed a communication under the river Thames between Rotherhithe and Wapping, was after numerous difficulties, finally accomplished, and opened on March 22, 1843, having been commenced by Sir I. S. Brunel in 1825. The total cost of the tunnel was about \$200,000, but the East London Railroad Company recently purchased it for a little over a third of that sum, and it is only used now for steam trains.

At Hammersmith Iron Works, England, it is reported, there has recently been constructed a number of centrifugal pumps, which are the largest that have ever been made. Each pump is intended to lift 250 tons, or upwards of 50,000 gallons of water per minute, to the height of six feet. The revolving disk, or fly-wheel, is six feet in diameter, and its width at the periphery is one-half inch. The suction and delivery pipes are 3 feet 6 inches in diameter. The whole height of each pump is 11 feet 6 inches, and its length 9 feet, while the extreme width in the direction of the main spindle is 8 feet 6 inches. The spindles are of Bessemer steel, 6 inches in diameter through the disk. The weight of the disk is eighteen hundred pounds, and of each side casing two tons thirteen hundred weight, the whole weight of each pump being seven tons.

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
