## GOVERNOR CUTLER MAKES STATEMENT

Why He Did Not Desire to Place  
An Exhibit In New  
York.

BELIEVES ACTION JUSTIFIED.

Sets Forth In Detail All Correspondence  
Between President of Ex-  
position and Himself.

The position of Gov. Cutler, in declining to make an exhibit from Utah at the mining exposition to be held in New York from May 25 to June 20, 1908, has been set forth in the following statement in regard to the matter, made by the governor himself:

"The legislature of 1907 appropriated the sum of \$2,000 to form the nucleus of a fund, which was to be increased by private subscription, to provide for an exhibit from the State of Utah at the International Mining exposition, to be held at Madison Square Gardens, New York, May 25 to June 20, 1908. Authority was given the governor to appoint a commission to superintend the exhibit and the expenditure of the money appropriated and contributed.

"Before acting on the authority thus given him, the governor desired to satisfy himself as to the high character and genuineness of the exhibition and the willingness of mining men and other public spirited citizens to assist morally and financially in placing the exhibit. With this object he consulted with some of the mining men of Utah and with others who he thought would be informed on these points.

"While he was unable to secure very much data regarding the genuineness of the project, he found it to be the consensus of opinion among the mining men of Utah that, on account of the depreciation in mining values and the depression in business conditions, and the long distance to the place where the exposition was to be held, it would not be advisable to attempt to place an exhibit. This opinion was expressed without a dissenting voice by such mining men as John Dorn, H. S. Joseph, Samuel Newhouse, Lafayette Holbrook, W. D. Sutton, and others.

"While these inquiries were being made, Mr. Porter, president of the exposition, stated to the governor that space was being taken so rapidly that if Utah did not immediately reserve a place for an exhibit the choice of space would be gone. Therefore, on Oct. 7, 1907, the governor made application for the reservation of a certain amount of space, with the following exact provision: That if it shall be determined that Utah will incur the expense of exhibiting with the distinct understanding that if Utah does not have an exhibit at this exposition there will be no liability incurred in taking space in this way."

"On Jan. 27, 1908, the governor wrote as follows to Mr. Porter: 'I have the honor to inform you that after due deliberation and consultation with leading mining men in the State of Utah, I have decided to appoint a commission and make provision for an exhibit from Utah at the exposition. I therefore withdraw application for space, in accordance with the agreement entered into between us, and stated in your letter of Oct. 11, 1907.'

"Since this letter was written, Mr. Porter has made several attempts to persuade the governor to reconsider his decision, but it has not seemed to be the wise thing to do. Finding that these efforts were futile, Mr. Porter wrote a letter to H. S. Joseph, executive director of the exposition, in which he stated that he was very much surprised to learn a few weeks ago that the governor had decided not to exhibit at our exposition. "The statement above is a full and accurate account of the negotiations which have been carried on between the president of this mining exposition and the governor of Utah. It has been the best of the governor to publish in all the papers a full account of the transactions connected with the matter. The only comment on the matter to make is that the later correspondence fully justifies, in his opinion, his action in declining to make an exhibit from Utah at the exposition."

## BOY BOUGLARS UNDER ARREST

Police Raid a Room on Second  
South at Early Hour  
This Morning.

QUICK WORK BY OFFICERS.

Young Men Accused of Entering Fred  
Andrews' Room and Stealing  
\$300 in Clothing.

At 6:35 this morning Sergt. Henry Johnston and Officers Johnson and Pierce, made a raid on a room in an east Second South roominghouse and arrested Forest Wilson, a messenger, aged 17 years; Al Grigier, a paper-hanger, 24 years old; Joe Porter, a laborer, aged 21 years; Louis Grinster, a laborer, aged 18 years, and Charles Kiley, a newsboy, aged 19 years, on the charge of burglary in the second degree.

It is charged that the young men entered the room of Fred Andrews, 33 Franklin avenue last night and stole therefrom four suits of clothes, an overcoat, a smoking jacket, a fur coat, two sets of brushes, a rug, two mufflers and an opera hat the property totaling the value of \$300.

The theft was discovered about midnight and at once reported to the police. Officers were detailed on the case and at 6:35 this morning Sergt. Johnston, and Officers Johnson and Pierce located the gang in an east Second South street roominghouse. They rushed in and placed all under arrest. Fred Andrews was found in the room and the police say they have most convincing evidence against the prisoners.

Members of the gang tell different stories as to their actions last night. Some of them declared they did not know the stuff was in the room while others say that the property was in the room when they entered the roominghouse and did not know who left it there.
