On the 19th of Oct., 1795, he went on a voyage from Milford Haven to Ireland, and

He remained at that station four years, then came home, joined the fleet under Admiral Parker, and went up the Baltic, where they took Copenhagen, April 2d, 1801. His next voyage was under "the immortal Nelson," who went to Boulogne harbor, to cut off the French fleet. Failing in this he returned, and our sallor went to Yar-mouth, where he left the service, and went out in a merchantman to China. On his return he was again impressed, and shipped on board the Romney, this time under the name of Edward Kingston.
