Storage Receipts for Druggists.

A company has been formed in Vienna with the idea of serving druggists storage receipts to the houses, in the same way in which milk, and other commodities are stored. The company has a sufficient development of stock, to supply them through the suburbs of Vienna daily, distributing their milk fully charged and taking away others whose energy has been exhausted.—Chicago.

The Views of Frederick George A. Smith on the Subject.

The subject of ripening the milk before adding the cream is to have a sufficient amount of acidity developed so that the curd will work clean in good time, and make a good, solid cutting, well flavored cheese.

The general principle underlying the manufacture of cheese depends primarily upon the action of the rennet in coagulating the curd of the milk, and to that way forming a larger portion of the fat. The sugar and albumen of the milk are primarily carried off in this way. The rennet is principally obtained from the stomach surface of the fourth stomach of a suckling calf. It is preserved for use by carefully cleaning without washing it and it is then rubbed with salt and dried. When wanted for use it is soaked in weak brine, and the liquid thus obtained is used to coagulate the milk.

When the latter is found to be in proper condition sufficient of the rennet solution is added to cause the milk to begin to thicken in from fifteen to thirty

minutes. It is then allowed to stand until the curd is firm enough to float by turning the back of the fingers and hand on it. When the curd is firm and ready for use it is cut into small cubes, each not more than half an inch in diameter.

It is necessary to use every care that the pieces of curd may be as uniform as possible, and that the butter and cream will be uniform in size, without which it is impossible to make fine cheese. The minimum loss of fat takes place in the process of cutting and handling immediately following. The globules of fat on the exposed surfaces are easily detached, thus the economy of carefully handling curd to enable and break the curd, and thus increase the amount of fat lost.

As soon as the curd is completely cut it is stirred very gently for ten or fifteen minutes, until the outside of the pieces shows the appearance of a slight film, and the whey commences to separate freely from the curd. The latter is then gradually heated to a temperature of about 100 degrees Fahrenheit. During the process it is kept in constant but gentle agitation. The heating should follow the action of the rennet, which should be the result and expel the moisture from the curd. It is very important at this time that just the right amount of moisture should be separated from the curd. If too much is driven out there will be a loss in yield and a weaker, hard textured cheese.

On the other hand, too much moisture means a cheese that crumbles too fast, and which will not set off flavor quickly for the reason that the retention of so much moisture retards the ripening process, the most favorable to the development of the bacteria of ripeness.

When the curd has become sufficiently firm and dry it is allowed to settle on the bottom of the vat and about half an hour is sufficient development of heat. To fully ripen it is then to the proper time to drain the whey from the curd, requires the best judgment of the maker, as it is one of the critical points in the ripening process.

The most common test used to determine the proper time to drain off the whey is known as the hot iron test. A piece of iron, partially dry, then placed against the curd and carefully drawn away. If the curd sticks to the iron and is drawn off in one piece, the curd is ready to be drained. If the curd is drawn off in two pieces, it is not ready to be drained. This test is repeated until the whey is drawn off in one piece.

To Keep Flowers Fresh.

Flowers may be kept fresh for a long time by putting a pinch of soda into the water in which they are held. They should not be gathered while the sun is shining upon them, but only in the morning or after the sun has been down for an hour. To preserve wilted flowers always place them in almost scalding water. This will draw the sap back into the flowers, causing them to become fresh. Then cut away the third of the stem which has been heated and place the flowers in cold water.—New York World.

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
