OF AN ASTEC CITY ON THE PLINES.-Since my last communication to the Times, I have paid a visit of exmination to the Placer Mountains, a range. The point where I reached the mountains was about twenty-seven miles from Santa Fe, in a south-westerly direction. About midway of the journey are the rains of a town of considerable extent. The foundations of many of the houses are as yet visible, and the boundaries of the plaza or public square can be traced by them. One of the reservoirs is in a good state of prepervation, and a portion of another. The ground on the site of the town and in its immediate vicinity is thickly strewn with pieces of crockery. No traditions exist among the present generation of the Pueblo Indians regarding this town, but it was undoubtedly one of the ancient Aztec cities. Similar ruins exist in many other sections of New Mexico, the most extensive being those of Gran Quevera, where, from the evidences that yet exist, the city must have been several miles in circumference. The undoubted descendants of the people who occupied these great towns and cities are the Pueblo, or village Indians, who number about 7,000 in New Mexico, and inhabit some seventeen villages within the limits of the territory. These Indians are industrious, frugal, honest, and virtuous, and, though professing the Roman Oatholic as their religion, mix with it many of their ancient rites and superstitions. They still look for the second coming of Montezuma.

Soon after passing the ruins of the ancient city, I came to a locality of considerable extent, where were numerous petrifications of sections and stumps of trees. Some of these stone trees were over three feet in diameter, showing that where the trees are now of the scrubby varieties, at one time immense forests of heavy timber existed .- Santa Fe (Dec. 13) Cor. N. Y. Times.
