ONLY TWO AT LARGE.

Most of Alleged Lynchers of Gorman and Walters Are Captured.

Basin City, Wyo., Nov. 11.—Only two of the alleged lynchers of Gorman and Walters, the murderers of Deputy Earl Price, who were indicted by the grand jury recently, are now at large. William Smith, who is alleged to have given the grand jury most of its information, and Fred Pender have left the state and are believed to be in Montana. Those indicted and placed under arrest are George Saban, Tom Tatlock, C. F. McKenzie, Ralph Mercer, Capt. Taylor and D. L. Morse. All were placed under heavy bonds.
Capt. Taylor is the son of "Cap" Taylor, who distinguished himself in the Black Hawk war in Utah. Young Taylor was born in Utah and lived there for many years. He now resides on the Hoover place on Shell creek. It is alleged that he harbored and fed members of the mob for two days before the jail was attacked.
Ralph Mercer was formerly a resident of Cheyenne. He is a son of the former editor of the Stockgrower's Journal, which passed out of existence with the Johnson county raid in 1891.
Morse is an ex-Confederate cavalryman. He has resided in this section many years.

MEDALS FOR SIGNAL CORPS.

The annual inspection of the signal corps was held last night in the Armory, where Lieut.-Col. Greenwald presented Sergt. Edward Shea with a gold medal for the highest individual score on the rifle range by an enlisted man for the season just passed. Private E. O. Marx was also presented with a silver medal struck from the same die for having made the second best score. The first medal was given by Col. Greenwald himself, and the other by Capt. A. A. Smith. Following inspection, there was an indoor baseball game between the corps and D company, in which the latter won, 23 to 18.

BOREAS GOES ON A RAMPAGE.

Hurricane Strikes City From the Northwest, Doing Considerable Damage to Property.

WIND BLEW 60 MILES AN HOUR

Cars Are Stopped, Signs Are Blown Down and Several People Narrowly Escape Serious Injury.

A hurricane struck the city from the north and northwest last evening, shortly after 7 o'clock, and in a few moments the velocity of the wind had reached 60 miles an hour. The wind was accompanied by hail and rain, and it was not long in leaving its marks on the town. Trees were torn up in many places. Two good sized trees blew over on south East Temple street, striking the trolley wires and disabling about half a block of the overhead plant. On West Temple a large poplar tree blew over onto the street car track and on east Fourth South and many other streets trees were felled by the wind and obstructed traffic. In the southern part of the city the electric light wires got short circuited, and the darkness down there was most dense until the drunken crowd raked needed repairs. For an hour or so, the street car service was badly demoralized, and the carmen didn't know where they were at or the passengers either.

GUESTS NARROWLY ESCAPE.

The big electric sign over the Knutsford hotel 2x4 feet, was blown from its fastenings and like the rain, descended upon the just and the unjust through the glass roofing of the hotel. Quite a number of guests were seated in the chairs underneath, but providentially escaped injury. The crash made a tremendous racket, and scattered the glass in small pieces far and wide; and the fact that nobody was hurt was regarded as marvelous. It was impossible to replace the roofing at the time, and the rain came through the opening, suggestive of a second deluge. The debris, however, was quickly cleaned up, but the damage done was not as much as was feared. Repairs are in rapid progress today, so that inconvenience to guests is reduced to a minimum.

HOUSE AFIRE.

The residence of W. H. Bird, 248 Fourth East street, was set on fire by broken electric light wires, but the flames were extinguished with small result. Car 41 was "burned out" while running near Ninth West street, and slight damage was suffered by other cars. Signs were blown down all over town, and the streets flooded with rain. In many residences the lights were blown out, and it was impossible to replace the roofing at the time, and the rain came through the opening, suggestive of a second deluge. The debris, however, was quickly cleaned up, but the damage done was not as much as was feared. Repairs are in rapid progress today, so that inconvenience to guests is reduced to a minimum.

RAINFALL HEAVY.

The rainfall was heavy, being .70 of an inch from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m., and .30 of an inch from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m., flooded, particularly in the southern part of the city. Where excavations are being made in the streets, there was great danger of accident, as danger lights were blown out, and it was unsafe for teams to go faster than a walk.
