WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Sessions of the high commission are held daily. There is a fair prevailing, in some quarters, that the recent discussion has developed difficulties of opinion which may prevent a peaceful settlement. In reply to a question, yesterday, one of the American Commissioners said that, if the Commission was able to reach satisfactory conclusions at all, it would terminate its labors by the middle of April. It is believed that the difficulty lies in the inability of the English Commissioners to meet the preliminary requirements for negotiations proposed by the American Commissioners as to the Alabama liabilities.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, 16.-The printers on the New York Volksman, German, are on strike for an advance of wages. The strike is a result of the fact that the Volksman's circulation is said to be 100,000 copies a week, and the printers demand a 10 percent increase in wages.

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It is said to have been stolen from Senator Cassell.

The civil suits against Captain Peabody, of the ship *Natchez*, are now pending in the courts. The defendant's counsel produced a release signed by the plaintiff.

The board of health is endeavoring to stamp out the small pox, and its vigorous efforts are crowned with success, although there has been a slight increase in the number of cases.

The people do not offer such strong resistance to vaccination as formerly.

The Tribune's Washington correspondent, on the 15th says there is a startling rumor, to-wit, which is not generally known, of advice received from Minister Sickles, suggesting that the result of his negotiations for several months past, a proposition from the Government of Spain for the sale, to this Government, of the islands of Cuba and Porto Rico. The amount asked is believed to be a hundred millions of dollars, payable in installments.

The number of immigrants arrived at this port since January first, is 9,734, being a decrease of 2,383 compared with the corresponding period of 1870.

The secretary of the French relief committee of the Chamber of Commerce in this city, has written to the Mayor of Philadelphia, asking him to permit the U. S. steamer *Relief* to come to this port after she has received the supplies there, so as to obtain a full cargo for shipment to the sufferers in France.

CALIFORNIA.

Shot dead—Stage captured by Apaches.

San Francisco, 16.—Dion beat Randolph on the 25th inst., scoring 1,000 against Randolph's 556.

Patrick Gibbons shot Martin Lovin dead, at Stockton, yesterday, over a land dispute.

The stage from Fort Yuma to Tucson was captured by Apaches, fifteen miles east of Gila Bend, on the 7th inst.

The driver, Thompson, received five bullets in the leg and arm in the chest, but escaped with the only passenger. This is the first attack made on a stage west of Tucson in fifteen years. The citizens are greatly alarmed, and are endeavoring to organize a company for the purpose of protecting the stage.

A mortgage on the franchise and charter of the Southern Pacific railroad, for twenty millions of dollars, was recorded yesterday.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Concord, 16.—The returns from 218 towns indicate that there has been a decided change in the election of governor by the people. Pike has 33,329 votes; Western 33,381; Cooper and scotling 10,714. The House stands 102 Republicans, 104 Democrats, and four labor reform. The Senate stands four Republicans, five Democrats and three vacancies. The executive council stands two and a half with a vacancy in the first district. Probably all the Democratic Congressmen are elected.

A violent storm prevails throughout Great Britain and Ireland, and though the telegraph lines are greatly deranged it is already known that many vessels are ashore or have otherwise received much damage. Details are yet missing and awaited with anxiety.

AUSTRIA.

Vienna, 16.—The Emperor, Francis Joseph, has issued a decree, in which he has decided to appoint a new minister of the interior, to replace the late Count de Salm-Reuth.

FRANCE.

Paris, 16.—Vino's forbids masquerade parties. Another journal has been seized. The Germans have released the Orleans railway.

WEST INDIES.

San Juan, 16.—The United States steamer *Natchez* arrived from Santa Domingo City on the 15th. Commissioners of the United States to the Dominican Republic are expected to arrive here on the 17th.

A morning newspaper announced yesterday, that United States infantry, numbering nearly, if not quite, 1,000 men, have been held in readiness on Governor's Island, ever since the San Domingan Commissioners left, to proceed to one of the islands in the event that the Commissioners should telegraph that the United States had decided to occupy the island.

General McDowell declared, yesterday, that he knew nothing of the matter, and that he was in no way connected with the telegraphing of the island in question, and is not aware of the slightest foundation for the report. The troops named have been at Governor's Island since October 1870, and will soon proceed to the north western frontier.

The returns from the elections, throughout Burlington county, N. J., are generally complete. They show that a majority of republicans have been elected. Burlington township gave a large Republican majority. Gordon in Millville, Cumberland county, the Republicans made a clean sweep, electing their mayor by a 2-1 majority.

In the U. S. Senate, yesterday, all persons who had been convicted, at the present term of the court, were sentenced by Judge Woodworth, with the exception of the one named, who was sentenced to imprisonment for life, and passing U. S. registered bonds of ten thousand dollars. One of these

has than has hitherto existed; and having performed that duty, we were reluctant to leave this beautiful island without doing ourselves the honor of calling and paying our respects to the President of the Haytian republic, that the same friendly and amicable relations that have so long animated the people of both nations may long continue. In doing this we but represent the sentiments of the President and people of the United States.

President Saget replied that he gladly reciprocated the feelings of friendship expressed by Mr. Wade, and would do all in his power to aid their researches. During some informal conversation Wade said he greatly regretted not being able to speak in their own language, because he would then be able to say a great deal that would tend to allay present feelings toward the United States, by showing points in which the Haytiens misunderstood, us. Saget, at this, earnestly said the educated class in Hayti fully understood and appreciated the condition of the United States, but a large class only remembered slavery, from the fact that they had themselves been slaves, and it was impossible to influence them. The President, at the close of the conference, said he would visit and visit the commissioners. He is not expected, however, on account of the general and popular feeling against the presence of the commissioners in the harbor.

Cassell has sent a communication to the frontier for the commission, in answer to a letter from Mr. Howe, written at Aquia, but the letter is delayed until the Haytian authorities can correspond with the minister in regard to receiving it.
