For the first time the name of Dustin Farnum, the actor, was linked with the name of Howard Gould's wife when the millionaire's long-expected answer to his wife's suit for a separation and alimony became an official record in the supreme court.

Mr. Gould's lawyers accused Katherine Clemons Gould, the ex-actress with having secretly met Farnum in the summer of 1906, with following him through New England, with accompanying him to his rooms in Pennsylvaniand various other towns, with touring with him about New York and Brooklyn in her automobile, and with taking him to the Hotel St. Regis, where she then lived.

According to their claim it was the wife's behavior with the good look ing star of "The Virginian" that caused Howard Gould to abandon his wife In addition to the clause involving Farnum the answer filed by the million aire's counsel embodies all the older allegations which he has previously made against her-misconduct with Col.
