## THE DENVER KINSTORFOOD.

Proposed in the East by Mr. Tolson  
and Clark.

Utah is not going to suffer the  
misfortune with which Colorado joined  
when it failed to make the legislature  
act in this city last fall and again.  
On the contrary the Council  
of this state are making preparations  
to appear in force at the House  
of Representatives, and especially well  
with their musical talents.

The other section of the grand festi-  
val in the capital, to be celebrated  
in Utah, will be the Teutonic  
choir, provided that they are  
permitted to appear, and we are  
going to have some important negotiations  
in progress.

Mr. Tolson, the agent for  
the Denver Kinistorfood, has  
arrived for the purpose of laying before  
the management of the festival a  
position in behalf of the city.  
He will be accompanied by his  
legal representative, Mr. Andrew  
Horn, attorney for the latter com-  
munity. The former is to be the  
chief negotiator, and one of his  
duties will be to write a letter to the  
council in which he says:

"We sections to have this festival  
in our city, I expect to enter it, but  
I would like to have a certain amount  
of time to get ready for the few long  
negotiations."

The choir gives evidence of sim-  
plicity on the part of the writers and of  
unconscious confidence in the manage-  
ment of the festival, and the  
former is anxious to have any

remaining except to agree upon the  
date.

The largest drama proposed by the

the festival, and the choir management has determined  
that the choir will go as a whole if  
not at all.

The simple fact is that big as the  
Denver festival is to be, the Salt Lake  
festival is to be for 12,000, least it  
is too large to cover for any, and there  
are little doubt that the management of  
the festival will be glad to have  
enough time to come out, leaving  
to smaller bodies of singers no  
competition at present.

The trip to Denver of Prof. Stephens  
and Mr. James will undoubtedly de-  
termine the dates.

## MORTGAGE TAXES.

Mortgage v. Held by Non-Residents Not  
Valid.

Assistant County Attorney Wane  
has rendered the following opinion on  
the mortgage tax question:

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah,  
July 2, 1890.  
The Honorable Board of Commissioners  
of Salt Lake County, Utah.

Gentlemen.—A large number of the  
mortgages in this state are held by  
non-residents, in one place or another, the  
general question as to whether or not  
under our existing revenue law, we can  
tax mortgages on the ownership of which  
we have no right to tax.

We find, on examination, that there  
is no special reference to the question  
in our revenue law book, which only  
provides generally for the taxation of  
mortgages the same as other personal  
property.

The question has been raised in almost  
every state of the Union, under  
the varied statutes, and the weight of authority  
against the proposition, is very  
decidedly against the proposition.

We find, however, that the general  
rule of the law is to lay down the general doctrine that the  
taxes of property of that character is  
at the discretion of the owner of the  
property and should be taxed at such  
a rate as may be elsewhere. After a  
careful examination of the law of this  
state, we are of the opinion and advise  
you, that you cannot legally  
hold for taxation, or successfully en-  
force the collection of taxes against  
mortgages held by non-residents of  
this state, and this is irrespective of  
the question as to whether the mort-  
gagee is drawn directly to such non-  
resident or to an express trustee who  
is a resident of this state but has no  
personal connection with the state, and  
is held by such mortgagee, or where  
the mortgage is drawn to a residential  
state who proves to you by some  
concrete evidence that he is simply a  
trader or entrepreneur, and that the  
true owner of the debt mortgaged  
is a non-resident of the state.
