PROSPECTIVE CABINET CHANGES

Secretary Shaw and Attorney-General Moody Will Both

OSCAR S. STAUSS ENTERS IT.

Bonaparte Goes to Department of Justice; Cortelyou to the Treasury; Geo. Von. L. Meyer to Postal Dept.

Washington, Oct. 23 .- The following statement regarding prospective changes in President Roosevelt's cabinet, was made public tonight at the White House:

On the retirement of Secy. Shaw and Attyl-Gen. Moody from the cabinet the following changes will be made: Secretary of the Treasury-George B.

Postmaster General-George Von L. Meyer. Attorney-General-Charles J. Bona-

parte. Secretary of the Navy-Victor H. Metcalfe.

Secretary of Commerce and Labor-Oscar S. Strauss.

The general understanding for some time has been that Atty.-Gen. Moody will retire on Jan, 1, and that Secy. Shaw will follow him March 4 next. On the first day of the year, therefore, Mr. Bonaparte, who is now secretary of the navy, will succeed Mr. Moody as Cascaret whenever you suspect you need attorney-general, and he will in turn one be succeeded by Mr. Metcalfe, secretary of commerce and labor, the latter's place being filled by Mr. Strauss. Mr. Cortelyou, now postmaster-general, will take Secy. Shaw's place on March 4, at which time Mr. Meyer is to become

postmaster-general.

The fact that Mr. Meyer was to have The fact that Mr. Meyer was to have a place in the cabinet has been known for some time, but the name of Mr. Strauss has been mentioned only incidentally in connection with the circle of the president's advisers. The transfer of Mr. Cortelyou to the treasury, Mr. Bonaparte to the attorney-genalship, and Mr. Meteslie to the narry become and Mr. Metcalfe to the navy has generally been accepted among the probabilities for some time, although it has been known that Mr. Benaparte and Mr. Metcalfe were for a time loath to leave their present positions because they had become so fully identified with the work of their respective de-partments. Mr. Meyer, who will be-come postmaster-general is ambassador come postmaster-general is ambassador to Russia. He is a native of Massachusetts, and has been well known as a business man. The appointment of Mr. Strauss caused considerable surprise, as it will be the first case where a citizen of the Hebrew faith has been a member of the president's cabinet. He was born in 1850, and is well known as a merchant, diplomat and author. He represented the United States as minister to Turkey on two different occasions, and was appointed by President Roosevelt to fill the vacancy caused by the death of former President Harrison as a member of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague.

JAPANESE MIDSHIPMAN RESIGNS FROM ANNAPOLIS.

Annapolis, Md., Oct. 23.—At the request of the Japanese embassy at Washington. Midshipman Asahi Kitigaki of the third class at the naval scademy, has submitted his resignation, which will be accepted, it is understood. Pending the department's action of his case, however, he has been granted an extended leave of absence. Kitigaki is a son of Baron Kitigaki, of the imperial privy council. The resignation of young Kitigaki removes the only remaining Japanese midshipman at the academy, the other one, K. Matsukata, having died last August of typhoid fever.

CAUSE OF RESIGNATION.

CAUSE OF RESIGNATION.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Inquiry at the navy department brought out the statement that the sole reason for the resignation of the Japanese midshipman, Kitigaki, from the naval academy at Annapolis, was a deficiency in studies. This fact was first reported by the superintedent of the academy to the department, which in turn communicated to the Japanese embassy with the result that the young man was requested to tender his resignation. As an act was passed at the last session of Congress prohibiting the further entry of fore.—Lers at the academy, there can, of course, be no other Japanese cadet admitted in his place.



Gov. Ide Says Natives Are Rapidly Learning American Methods.

Honolulu, Oct. 22.—Former tlov.Gen. Ido of the Philippines arrived here today on the steamer Hongkong Maru en route to San Francisco.

In an interview Mr. Ide said that the Filipinos were rapidly learning American political methods. In all municipal affairs they elect their own officials and he predicts that in 10 years they will be an integral part of the United States. He says they are more completely pacified now than ever before. Those remaining in opposition to American authority are but a few religious fanatics.

PETRIFIED SKELETONS.

Three American Museum of National History Expeditions Return Laden.

New York, Oct. 24 .- Three big expeditions of the American museum of na-tural history arrived from the Rocky Mountain region yesterday after several months' rough work, bringing nearly two carloads of petrified skeletons of nearly 500 animals, many new to sci-ence, some of which lived on earth, it s estimated by the scientists, hundreds

of centuries ago.

Among the many rare findings were two dinosaura, new to science, one of which was of huge proportions, bearing which was of huge proportions, bearing some resemblance to the great creature known as triceratopa. The expeditions were conducted under Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborne, paleontologist of the museum, and of the governments of the United States and Canada. The expeditions covered the Washakie basin in southern Wyoming, the Laramie formation of eastern central Montana, and the Black Hills.
