UNION NON-COMMITTAL.

NEW WAGE SCALE.

NEW WAGE SCALE.

The new scale of wages announced today is based on the wages paid at Tonopah, where the cost of itving is renceded to be 20 par cent cheaper than in Goldfield. To cover this point the Mine Owners' association has agreed to either induce the merchants here to lower their prices or else to open general stores and boarding houses where prices will be lower than at present. The officers of the local miners' union say they place little confidence in the statement of the Mine Owners' association, and that such statements, which they characterize as "biuffs," have been issued before, and the promises contained in them not kept. Reports of attempts at intimidation, threats of violence, and even attempts to commit violence, are being constantly heard tonight, but at union headquarters these are characterized as fakes, and in instances where personal encounters have occurred the evidence obtainable is that the disturbances are caused by irresponsible parties, and that the union the disturbances are caused by irresponsible parties, and that the union officials are endeavoring to prevent disorder and violence. President Charles Mackinnon of the Goldfield Miners union said tonight that the executive committee was not holding a regular meeting today, and that it would not do so, ner would the union take any official action regarding the reduction in wages of the miners until tomorrow night, the time for holding the regular monthly meeting of the executive committee. executive committee.

DOESN'T TRUST OWNERS.

President MacKinnon declared that the union put no reliance on statements issued by the Mine Owners' association, because the confidence of the miners' union had been repeatedly betrayed by the association, and he would only say that the reduction would be considered at the meeting tomorow night, and some plan of action or inaction decided upon.

"We are playing a waiting game," he said. "The owners have precipitated a fight; have induced Gov. Sparks to ask for troops; have determined to drive the Western Federation out of the camp, and have decided to reduce wages. All the trouble that may result from these unwarranted actions the mine owners will be responsible for."

The troops are tonight patrolling the ground around the Consolidated and other prominent mines of the camp, as also are a large number of deputy constables sworn in by Constable Claud Imman. President MacKinnon declared that

constables sworn in by Constable Claud Inman.

It was learned tonight that an attempt will be made tomorrow morning to start work on the Mohawk Combination lease. No underground work will be attempted, but Munager Stebert states that he will work the dumps, beginning at 7 o'clock tomorrow morning, and that he has men enough to handle the work. He has made no request for deputies or troops to guard the property or protect the workmen.

The first bullet struck Joe Little, a painter, killing him instantly. Sousins received a mortal wound and died in half an hour. Bradley gave himself up and was taken to jail by the sheriff, where he was booked on two charges of murder. There were a dozen people in the place at the time of the shooting, but none other than those mentianed were struck.

RECEIVER'S REPORT ON THE HAMILTON BANK

New York, Dec. 9.-The report of Receiver White of the Hamilton bank, which closed its doors Oct. 23, was made public tonight. The total loans and discounts are \$6,677,445. Of this amount \$1,825,42% is secured by collateral other than real estate; \$2,213,285 by real estate, \$496,427 by single name papers without other security, and \$1.644.

Since suspending notes to the value of \$1,851,297 have become due, and upon these has been paid \$231,049.

The report shows that E. R. Thomas, president or the Hamilton bank up to Oct. 29, withdrew between Oct. 16 and 23, the latter date being the time of the lank's suspension, \$65,741; that he now has to his credit \$1,311, and is liable to the institution in the sum of \$64,150 as maker and endorser and gnaranter of notes.

William R. Monigomery, who succeeded Thomas as president, withdrew Oct. 22 and 23, according to the report, \$1,518, lenving a balance of \$7,11 to his credit. O. F. Thomas, a director, on Oct. 23 withdrew \$300, leaving a balance of \$149, but was liable in the sum of \$51,256 as maker, endorser and guarantor of notes. David Sullivan, a director, had no account, but is liable as maker or guarantor of paper discounted for \$155,000. F. Augustus Helnze, also a director without an account, is liable in a like manner for \$80,009.

The receiver enumerates various louns appearing on the books of the bank, the collateral to secure which, he declares, is madequate. Among those are \$80,009 to F. A. Heinze, \$100,000 to Ct. R. MAKING EFFORT TO SHORTEN PETTIBONE TRIAL

Boise, Ida., Dec. 9.—By agreement of attorneys for the state and defense in the Pettibone case, the trial was continued until tomorrow morning, when the opening statement for the prosecution will be made by James H. Hawley. The postponement was agreed to partially because Senator Borah cannot reach the city until tonight, and partially that a stipulation between the state and defense as to certain evidence may be drawn.


