## NEW YORK.

Irene Logan Shot—The Gunboats Getting Ready—Commercial Failures—Legislative—Cuban Expedition—Military—Disagreeing—New Conservative Leader in England.  
NEW YORK.—Irene Logan, familiarly known in connection with the mysterious Twelfth street murder, as Irene Logan number two, was shot through the heart by Jerry Dunn alias Hawkshaw, a notorious ruffian, in Houston street, this morning.  
The thirteen Spanish gunboats, which have been lying at quarantine for over ten days past, preparing for sea, will take their departure for Havana to-day; the crews of the different vessels are actively engaged in preparations for sea.  
NEW YORK.—There are rumors to-day of other mercantile failures.  
The Cunard packet left to-day without mail.  
ALBANY.—The Senate to-day adopted Tweed's resolution repealing the resolution adopting the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, by a vote of 23 against 16. The resolution was subsequently adopted by the Assembly.  
The Commercial Advertiser states that the English brig Redoubt has gone to sea under the American flag, with fifty Americans, thirty Cubans, a quantity of arms and ammunition and a large amount of supplies on board, which were shipped for Nassau. The brig was chartered by the Cuban Junta. She will proceed to Cuba and effect a landing under the protection of a steamer which left last week.  
A warrant was issued by Justice Dowling to-day, at the instance of Mr. Foster, assistant editor of Wilkes Spirit of the Times, for the arrest of Messrs. Bruce and Simpson, proprietors of the Turf, Field and Farm, for an alleged libel on Geo. Wilkes. An application of a similar nature for an alleged libel by Wm. M. Connor, the St. Louis correspondent of Wilkes Spirit, was previously refused.

## WASHINGTON.

Payments of the Treasury—Naval Orders—Telegraphers' Strike—Indian News—Lopes' Son in Washington.  
WASHINGTON.—The total payments by the Treasury for the month of December, exclusive of the payments on account of interest and the redemption of the public debt, was eleven million, seven hundred and forty-seven thousand, two hundred and eighty-two dollars.  
Commander Jno. H. Greene has been ordered to be in readiness to command the eastern squadron of the North Atlantic fleet, now commanded by Admiral Poor. This squadron comprises the vessels North of Cuba and South of Chesapeake.  
The strike of the telegraphers continues. The main office here is transacting its business, though with a considerably smaller force. Additional striking is reported through the South.  
Official advice to the Indian Department from Camp Supply, Idaho, state that the agent at Farmington had, in a recent interview with Powderface, one of the Arapahoe chiefs, learned that a part of that tribe, in connection with some of the leading Cheyennes, had had a peace talk with portions of the Osages, Comanches and Kiowas, and had agreed on peace.  
Lopes, son of the President of Paraguay, arrived here to-day.

## PENNSYLVANIA.

Governor's Message.  
HARRISBURG.—Governor Geary's message was sent in at noon. He congratulated the Legislature on the prosperity of the State. There has been received in the State Treasury during the year five million, two hundred and forty-one thousand; the expenditures four million, eight hundred and fifty thousand, including four hundred and seventy-two thousand expended toward the reduction of the public debt, leaving a balance in the treasury of one million, four hundred thousand. The amount of the State debt is thirty-two million, eight hundred and fourteen thousand. The Governor recommends the establishment of a house for disabled soldiers, as a refuge for those now compelled to beg in the streets of cities. The Avondale disaster is referred to, and a law recommended enforcing stringent regulations to prevent a recurrence of such calamities. The message deprecates the efforts of traders to obtain the introduction of steel and iron free of duty. It favors the recognition of Cuba and says it, geographically, belongs to the United States. It advocates the expansion of the currency by new national banks, to be established where none now exist.

## MISSOURI.

Big Fire.  
ST. LOUIS.—The extensive wholesale drug house of Wm. Doenne and Co. is now burning, with prospects of the total destruction of the stock, valued at about ninety thousand; insured for seventy-five thousand.

## NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Democratic Convention.  
CONCORD, N. H.—The Democratic State Convention has nominated Gen. John Bedeto for Governor; Gen. M. T. Donaho for Railroad Commissioner. Resolutions were adopted expressing abiding faith in the principles of the party, in denouncing the action of Congress in relation to Georgia, exacting honesty and fidelity in government officials, denouncing monopolies, declaring centralization and monopoly as the twin instruments of evil, that all contracts, bonds and securities should be taxed and that the public debt, if not otherwise specified, should be paid in currency.

## OHIO.

Severe Accident.  
COLUMBUS.—T. M. Naughton, President of the City Council, was run over by a locomotive this afternoon and badly injured; his arm and leg were amputated and he will probably die.

## VIRGINIA.

Death of Hon. W. L. Goggin.  
RICHMOND.—Hon. Wm. L. Goggin, formerly member of Congress, from Virginia, and the Whig candidate for Governor in 1859, died yesterday.

## MASSACHUSETTS.

Legislature Convened.  
BOSTON.—The Legislature convened to-day. P. Coolidge was elected President; Harvey Jewett was re-elected Speaker of the House.

## LOUISIANA.

Salute Again.  
SHREVEPORT.—Lieut. A. R. Colby, of the United States army, son of D. C. Colby, of the Treasury Department, saluted at Jefferson on the 31st ult., by shooting himself through the head with a revolver.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

### GREAT BRITAIN.

The "Times" on the Spanish Crisis.  
LONDON.—The Times, to-day, has an article on the crisis in Spain, in which the writer deprecates the downfall of Gen. Prim, and attributes it to the unnecessary prolongation of the provisional reign.

### SPAIN.

More Rain.  
MADRID.—It is rumored that Regent Serrano will be invested with sovereign power, but the constituent Cortes hesitates to take so extreme a measure. The partisans of the Duke of Montpensier are very active.

### FRANCE.

Treasure to be Recovered.  
PARIS.—An expedition is preparing to depart from France to recover five hundred million francs in treasure lost some years ago from Spanish vessels on the coast of Spain.

### LISBON.

Assembly of the Cortes.  
LISBON.—The general Cortes has assembled. The session was opened by king Louis. In his speech his majesty referred, with gratification, to the state of tranquility which now exists at home and abroad. He promises that the government will introduce important measures of reform and economy.

Editor Deseret News.—Dear Sir,—Myself being a native of Indiana, I feel a certain pride, which is, I hope, not unnatural and not blameable, that induces me to watch with zealous care over the reputation of the "Hoosier" fraternity generally. Hence, you need not be surprised when I ask a sufficient space in your valuable paper to make an effort to ward off any blow which may have been erroneously aimed at my friends from Indiana, by simply remarking that that little "unpleasantness" to which you allude in your paper of yesterday, did not take place amongst Indiana's sons. Whatever might have occurred, we are not implicated in the fracas, if any has taken place. And whilst I am writing, I think it not improper to say that, fearing your article may—though certainly not intended—have a tendency to create a prejudice against persons from that State who may be in Utah, either as citizens in a private capacity or as Government appointees, though there are a goodly number of your own people in Utah who are natives of Indiana, and as I believe, in excellent standing too; yet there are but two gentlemen from that State at this time holding official positions under the government in Utah, and they were not engaged in a fight, as suggested by you, and I am not afraid to venture the assertion, that in the discharge of their official duties here, your people will have but little reason to complain, unless I am greatly mistaken.

Editor Deseret News.—Sir—I visited the school on Christmas day in order to be present at the distribution of prizes

to the children. There are about one hundred and fifty scholars attending, presided over by Bro. Ralph Foster, assisted by several of the young brethren and sisters, as teachers, and I am sure that great credit is due them for the pains they have taken in instructing the rising generation. About thirty of the scholars repeated chapters from the Book of Mormon, Bible and Testament, and a great many spoke secular pieces, all acquiring themselves in a very creditable manner. After the distribution of the prizes the children went home happy and light of heart.

The Elders' quorum in this place is delivering a series of lectures, every Tuesday evening. The Dramatic Association is in full running order, and opened the season with "The Floating Beacon," and "Good for Nothing Man." So you see we are provided with amusements of one shape or another to last us the winter. Our Co-operative store is in a prosperous condition, and is giving satisfaction to the people. And last but not least, I may add that the Saints of Mendon are trying to live their religion and keep pace with the times.

CANTON, Bradford County, Penn., Dec. 21, 1869.

Editor Deseret News.—Dear Bro.—I left Utah Nov. 1st, to fill the mission to the United States that was appointed to me. I was accompanied by Bro. O. Kilbourn, from Centerville. We arrived in Canton, Nov. 8th, and commenced our labors in the ministry, going from house to house, testifying to the truth of the gospel, as revealed from Heaven to Joseph Smith, the Prophet. Our teachings are faith, repentance, baptism, and the laying on of hands for the reception of the Holy Ghost. The people listen with much attention; but when polygamy is touched upon, they are inclined to ridicule and charge us with the sins that they are guilty of as a people, to which, of course, there are a few exceptions. Bible proof concerning plural marriage does not seem to satisfy them.

We visited a family who are wealthy and consider themselves of a higher grade in society than their fellows. They wished us to speak upon polygamy, and in the course of our conversation Mrs. said that she would rather go to work washing by the day and get money for her husband to go to a house of ill fame with, than to have him take another wife. Husband, daughter and son were present; the latter meekly rebuked his mother.

We have held five public meetings, and there are a few who are inclined to believe our testimony; but the people are guarded very closely by their priests. Many falsehoods are in circulation against our people, and the priests warn their flocks in public meetings against our doctrine. Thus far the Lord has sustained us and we are enabled to speak with boldness the things pertaining to His kingdom.

About thirty-seven years ago the gospel was preached here by Martin Harris and others. Many of the old heads that heard them are now living, who by the by are no particular help to us. After Christmas we design visiting Williamsport, forty miles from Canton. If our testimony is not received in that place we intend to visit the central portion of Iowa.
